### SCHOOL RE-OPENS

The school boy's summer vacation is over and he sighs as he resumes a desk and a round of duties incidental to becoming a good citizen and an intelligent one.

This community has schools which are on a par with the best anywhere, both in grades and high school. What enormous strides in education from the "little red schoolhouse" days have been made in the best few years may be seen in a tour of the grade schools and Deerfield-Shields, a high-school which has few equals and, we venture, no superiors in its class.

The business of becoming a citizen grows increasingly complex with the years. Schools and instructors, to be of service in a rapidly advancing age, must keep pace.

### IN THE NAME OF THE LAW

A travesty on that clause of the constitution of these United States which provides for the inviolable right of each citizen to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness is seen in the law throwing open personal tax lists for the inspection of a curious, ogre-eyed public. Newspapers which pander to this popular taste share in the opprobrium.

It is not sufficient that the already harrassed citizen be forced to contribute a good share of his income in the form of taxes upon practically everything he daily uses. He must now submit with grace to the publication of the tax upon the income itself, for the edification of his long-nosed, prying neighbor.

But for the callousness which a surplus of like distasteful and extraneous laws has created in him, the American citizen would rise in rebellion at a law which throws up the curtains of his private life and reveals to every "peeping-Tom" details which he has long regarded as personal and inviolate.

The phrases "rubbing it in" and "making him like it" fit the case. The American citizen is a patient, meek creature, easy to get along with and hard to arouse. But it would be difficult to find an intelligent being who would condemn him should he turn and fight back, fight for what should be his by right in the land of the free—personal freedom.

One Chicago newspaper, eager for spicy space-filler for a sensation-seeking clientele, devotes page after page to publication of income taxes. Another, an evening journal, sacrifices sensational news for clean journalism and good taste. Little more need be said as to their relative merits.

Little wonder that when the phrase "respect for law" is heard nothing but a hoarse laugh echoes in response.
