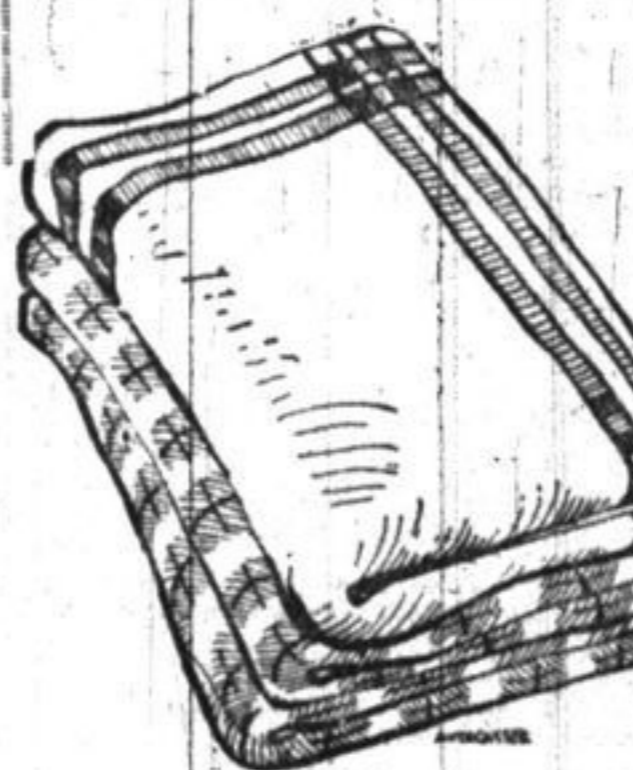

Deerfield Architect to Give Course of Lectures

Karl H. Sheldon, who resides in the Fred Stryker house on Rosemary Terrace, and who is a practicing architect, with offices in the Wrigley Building and a member of the Illinois Society of Architects, will give lectures on construction in a new course in real estate education, in co-operation
