Obituary

Obituary of Mr. Philip Rommel of Deerfield, Ill.

Mr. Rommel was born on July 12, 1859 in Schmied by Canstadt Wertenberg, Germany. In the year of 1881 he came to America, taking up his first place of residence at Chicago. There he resided only for a short time for he soon came to Deerfield, finding employment in a harness shop as harnessmaker, which trade he had learned in Germany. Two years later he went in business for himself, following this profession until the time when illness forced him to abandon it a few months before his death.

In 1881 he married Josephine Alardt of Deerfield, daughter of Rev. Allardt. In her he found a very faithful helpmate and for 41 years they shared joys and sorrows of life. Three boys were born to this union, Oscar (at home); Carl of LaGrange, Ill.; Louis of South Bend, Ind. Since the time of their marriage Mr. Rommel has been a faithful member of his church. For 25 years he served as secretary of the congregation. He loved his church and was very anx-

ious for its future development. A rather sudden turn in his physical nature forced him to cease his activities and take to the bed of sickness. Last fall he showed first signs of his illness but not until this last spring was he forced to abandon his profession. Since that time on, his conditions gradually became worse.

He was taken to Highland Park hospital for an operation. Rather unexpectedly he passed out of this life Wednesday morning, Sept. 2, 1925, at the age of 66 years, 1 month and 21 days.

He leaves to mourn his bereaved wife, three sons, Oscar, Carl, and Louis, two daughters-in-laws, Mrs. Carl and Mrs. Louis Rommel; four grandchildren, three brothers, five sisters and a host of relatives and friends.

Burial was at the North Shore cemetery, on Friday afternoon, following services at St. Paul's church with Dr. Leuder of Elmhurst and Rev. Piepenbrok officiating.

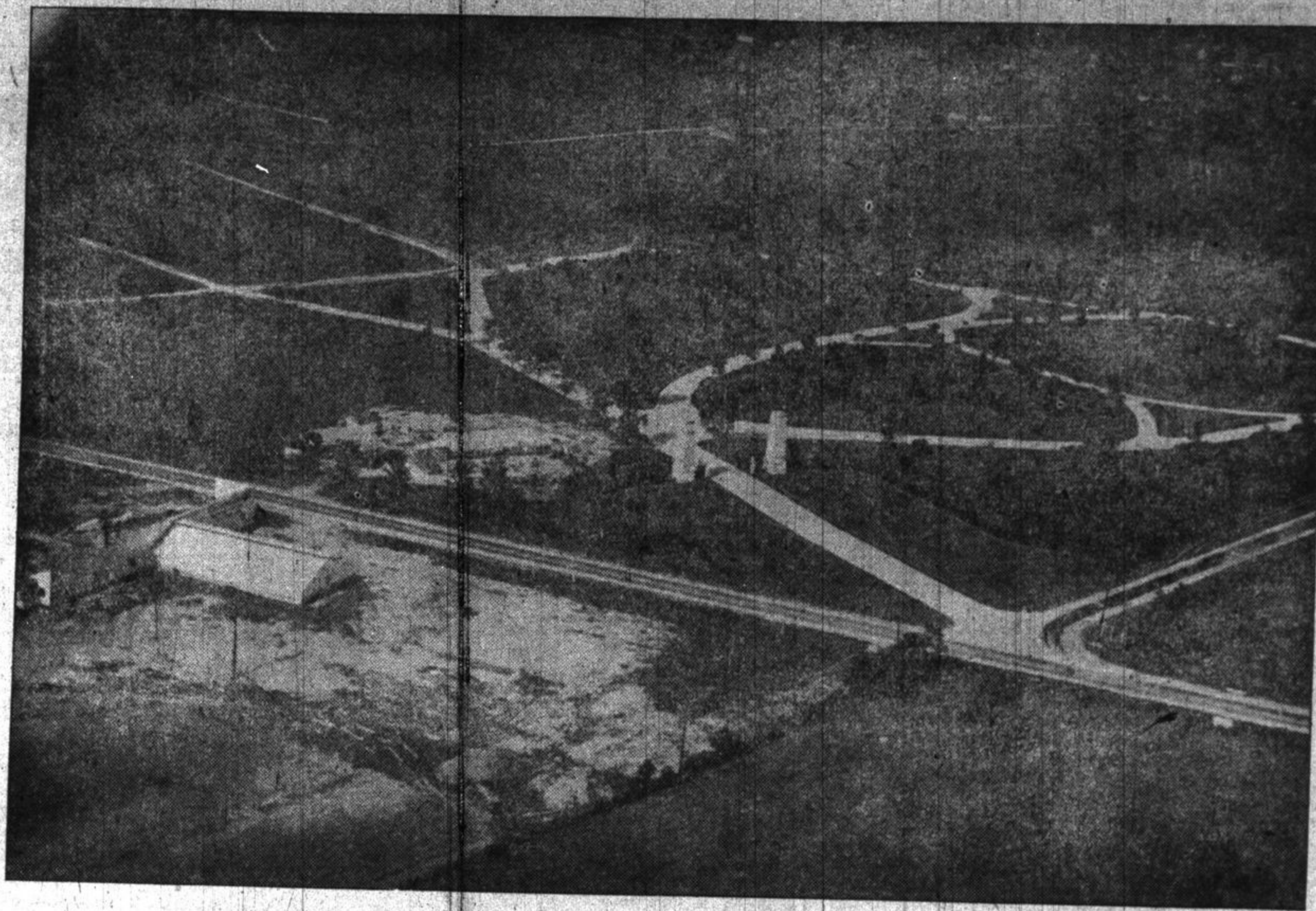

Washington, Sept. 4.—The Chicago and Northwestern railroad today applied to the Interstate Commerce commission for permission to acquire control by purchase of outstanding capital stock of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railroad. The Northwestern, which owns 51 per cent of stock of the Omaha, proposes to give five shares of Northwestern for seven shares of Omaha common and three shares of Northwestern common for two shares of Omaha preferred.

In the lists of income taxes as paid by prominent persons in this, the Chicago district, it is shown that Wilbur Glenn Voliva, of Zion, Ill., this year paid \$16,959. This is one of the biggest income taxes paid by any resident of Lake county with the exception of some millionaires who reside part of the time in Lake Forest or Highland Park.

"Y" SCHOOLS PROVE CASE FOR ALL-YEAR Instance Cited to Verify Wide-spread Opinion on Full Year Term

While the controversy regarding lengthening of the public school program to include the summer months continues to attract great interest, an examination of a private school where the summer session is regularly offered reveals that not only is it an advantage to the school, but that a majority of students elect the summer school work.

Figures compiled by H. F. Hancock, director of the Central Y. M. C. A. schools, shows that in the day and evening classes in the high school the enrollment is 50 per cent as large as in the regular terms. In the college of arts and science, the proportion is 60 per cent, while in the Junior school for boys from 10 to 17 years of age, 75 per cent of the number in the nine-months' school represents the summer enrollment.

The summer school plan has been in use continuously in the Y. M. C. A. schools since 1904, and is said to be one of the chief reasons for the low pupil cost despite the small number in classes. For the year 1924, each student in the schools cost \$56, as compared with a cost of \$80 per student in the Chicago public elementary schools, \$157 in the public high schools and \$410 in the typical college.

Summarizing the advantages of the all-year school program from the results of more than twenty years' experience of the Y. M. C. A. schools, Mr. Hancock said:

"To students, it means a saving of ten to twelve weeks a year; greater progress because of continuous attention to studies, especially in mathematics, languages and science; pleasant summer occupation compared with the absolute idleness of a three month vacation, and entrance into high school or college from one to three years earlier.

"To teachers, an opportunity to teach four quarters a year with pro-

leaving four weeks of vacation, and proportionate increase in salary, still elimination of unnecessary effort at the beginning of the school year.

"To the school, ability to handle a larger number of students at the same overhead cost for building and maintenance.

"To the community, a saving of 25 per cent of the time of the students, resulting in commensurate decrease in educational costs for each individual, and a decrease in taxation rates or an increase in efficiency of school plants at the same rate."

STAHL'S HAT IN RING FOR SHERIFF

Lester Tiffany, chief deputy under Sheriff Ahlstrom, and Lawrence Doolittle, Waukegan merchant, also have announced their candidacies. Other possible candidates have been mentioned but no additional announcements have been made.
