RULING REVERSED IN FARRIS CASE SHERIFF LACKS WARRANT Higher Court Decrees That Evidence Obtained by Unlawful Search Can Not Be Admitted

On the grounds that the County court was in error in admitting certain testimony in the case of William Farris, a justice of the peace at Half Day, who was sentenced to jail for 100 days on a liquor charge and ordered to pay the costs of the case, the Appellate court at its last session reversed the decision of the County court and remanded the case for new trial.

A copy of the decision of the higher court was received last week by Attorney E. V. Orvis, who is counsel for Farris, from Justice L. Johnson, clerk of the court.

When the case was heard in County court by Judge Perry L. Persons in January, the court agreed with Attorney Orvis that liquor confiscated at a store operated by Farris could not be introduced in evidence as the raid was made by Sheriff Edwin Ahlstrom and two deputies without a warrant. The warrant they possessed allowed them to search only the man's home. On a previous ruling the Appellate court held the liquor taken without a warrant could not be admitted in evidence.

Allow Testimony However, the court, allowed testimony on the sheriff and his men that the liquor was found in the store. Attorney Orvis, in raising objections, said that admission of the testimony was but another way of proving what the liquor itself would have proved if admitted in evidence. It was chiefly on this ground that Attorney Orvis based his appeal. The higher court's move in upholding Orvis is an important decision and may affect many other cases. The sheriff's office armed with a warrant allowing search of Farris' home, went there on Oct. 30 and also went to his store. When they entered the building, Farris broke a bottle spilling part of the contents. The sheriff also testified that another bottle put it into another bottle. The sheriff also testified that another bottle of liquor was found in the basement. The Appellate court ruled that evidence obtained by unlawful search was inadmissible. The court said that if such evidence was allowed, it would mean the nullifying of the rights guaranteed by the constitution and the legalizing of illegal searches. The instruction given the jury that such pouring or destruction of liquor was prima facie evidence that such fluid was intoxicating liquor and was kept in violation of the act. The Appellate court held that the instruction was erroneous. Norman L. Jones, chief justice of the Appellate court who ruled on this case also took a prominent part in a decision favoring Attorney Orvis some four years ago in the Stanley Bishop case. This case was reversed and remanded on the grounds that a raid was made without a search and seizure warrant.

HOW YELLOWSTONE PARK ACQUIRED NAME

Continued from page one one of four entrances because Uncle Sam collects \$7.50 from each automobile driver to help him maintain the expenses of management. The North or Gardiner entrance is 5 miles from the Loop, the west entrance is 13.7 miles, the southern entrance is 23 miles and the eastern, 26.6 miles. All of these roads from the entrance gates to the great central driveway traverse canyons, as they follow the beds of mountain streams.

The name "Yellowstone" originated with the Indians who described the steep sides of the river canyon by a term meaning "yellow stone" in English. This river rises just outside the boundary of the park to the southeast and flows in a northwesterly direction for several miles, passing thru a remarkable lake of the same name. The name is eminently appropriate as yellow is the predominating color in the great spectacle presented by the steep sides of the Grand Canyon of this river for miles below the Lower or Great Falls. For a long distance the sides of this canyon are so steep that vegetation does not get a foot-hold in the soft volcanic earth and rock which presents conspicuous, white and purple. This canyon is noted primarily for its panorama of color effects as it is only 600 to 1200 feet in depth while other great canyons are much deeper and much wider. A few miles below Yellowstone Lake the water of this river forms picturesque rapids for a quarter of a mile then drops 109 feet in what is known as the Upper Falls, and about a half mile farther downstream it drops 308 feet, forming what is known as the Lower or Great Falls.

431 MORE MILES OF PAVED STATE ROADS

Agricultural Foundation Gets Statistics; New Highways Cost \$13,045,775 Illinois farmers and tourists now enjoy 431 miles more of Federal-aid highways than they did a year ago, according to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. This mileage, completed in the year ending June 30, cost a total of \$13,045,775, of which the federal government furnished \$6,360,529. Highway construction under this plan now under way in the state totals 270 miles, while the total mileage completed previous to last year was 804 miles.

This additional mileage, while a convenience to the tourists in the state, is a godsend to the farmer, according to the foundation. It is estimated that each and every farmer in this section of the country averages 32 tons of farm products hauled to market and 9 tons of feed, fuel, fertilizer, machinery, supplies, etc., from town. When good roads make trucks feasible this is not very burdensome, but it represents a good many hours' labor where horses and poor roads must be used. And so while the tourist finds inter-city roads mighty comfortable, to the farmer a good serviceable road from his farm

to the nearest market is a downright necessity. The expansion of hard road systems both in this and other states in recent years has given the farmer an added inducement for going into business for himself, the foundation states. That he has not been slow to take advantage of the opportunity is testified in the increasing number of roadside markets on the more frequented highways. Figures show that each of these markets takes in fifteen to thirty dollars up to several hundred dollars a day, varying with the locality, the preponderance of buyers being tourists driving through the vicinity. Some of these are nothing more than stands of simple board construction while the more pretentious are housed in buildings which may be locked after the day's or the season's business. The most successful of the markets are so placed as to have convenient parking facilities where prospective buyers may examine the articles of goods, which should be of good quality yet moderately priced and attractively displayed.
