ORGAN WIZARD AT NEW ALCYON THEATRE

Carl B. Lagerquist, Organist of National Reputation Will Play Here

Carl B. Lagerquist, known far and wide over the United States as an organist of great musical genius, will preside at the console Alcyon golden voiced organ.

Mr. Lagerquist comes to Highland Park with a national reputation as organist and composer.

He has been playing large organs since he was 16 years old, when he played the great organ of the Ashland Avenue Baptist church, Toledo, O., the largest church and organ in northwestern Ohio.

While in Wisconsin, Mr. Lagerquist composed the music to the new Wisconsin song, "Where Monona's Waters Play," which swept the state in a wave of instant popularity.

Mr. Lagerquist fondly cherishes the memory of his five years at the Pearl theatre in Highland Park, which was at that time the only theatre in Chicago's exclusive suburbs where proximity to Ravinia Park, the home of the world famous summer opera, gave him association with world famed musicians who came to the Pearl theatre to hear him and cheer him in their hours of relaxation.

Now, once more, the people of Highland Park and the north shore will be able to hear this noted organist play on the wonderful new Alcyon theatre golden voiced organ.

REVIVAL PLANNED FOR ASSOCIATION N. SHORE MUNICIPALITIES

Meeting To Be Called in Near Future by Secretary Warren; Waukegan-No. Chicago and Lake Forest Indifferent

Steps will be taken soon to revive the life and interests of the Association of North Shore Municipalities, which was organized before the war to take up and deal with problems of common interest to the several affiliated towns.

The object of the general organization, as stated in the charter granted them by the state, is to "secure the co-operation of all North Shore municipalities in the administration of questions which affect the entire community; to acquire and disseminate valuable commercial, scientific and economic information pertaining to the business of the municipalities and to secure uniform action, economy and efficiency in the administration of municipal affairs."

The matters dealt with include eleventh departments: franchise, lighting, water, local improvements, police, health and bathing beach regulations, sanitation, municipal purchase clearing house, municipal accounting, tax valuations, water purification and sewage disposal, public utilities, municipal law and legislation.

Waukegan-North Chicago, original members, can not fall in line with the new note in the associations which plans to reserve North Shore towns as residential communities, free from industrial encroachment.

With Waukegan and Lake Forest inactive, and Evanston actively interested, the association, when it meets, will be composed of executives from the following towns: Highwood, Highland Park, Glencoe, Deerfield, Wilmette, Kenilworth, Winnetka and Evanston.

NO TRACE FOUND OF HOWARD STOKER

Mystery Surrounds The Disappearance of Highwood Resident September 9

Mystery surrounds the disappearance, on Wednesday, Sept. 9, of Howard W. Stoker, 28, from his home on Prairie avenue, Highwood. He had made his usual round of collections for the Prudential Insurance company, had cashed the checks at a bank in Highland Park, as usual; but no later trace could be found of him, although the best founded rumors reported him driving north between Glencoe and Highwood about three o'clock of the day he disappeared.

It was the day for him to report at the insurance company's office in Chicago, where he was accustomed to go at about two o'clock. At three the company called Mrs. Stoker and asked the reason for Mr. Stoker's delay. At five they called again to report that he had not shown up. It was not until then that Mrs. Stoker grew alarmed, for she knew of no reason for him to leave his home, where he has a wife and two children, the youngest of which is but eight weeks old, his position that he had had for two years, and numerous friends.

Since Mr. Stoker's disappearance, no slightest trace of him has been substantiated, although various rumors have been traced to their source, and been found to be simply rumors. The police, the American Legion, radio, detectives—all manner of agencies have been used in an effort to locate him, to no avail.

His family fears that he is wandering about aimlessly, with a loss of memory due to some shock received in his fourteen months across during the war; or that he has been held up, his money and car taken, and his body effectually concealed. All that they can do is to wait and hope that nothing serious has happened to him.

Last Year's Chicago Champions Bring Veteran Team Here to Play Deerfield in Season Opener

Deerfield-Shields' football season will be officially inaugurated Saturday by the game with Lindblom on the field next the high school. Lindblom, last year's Chicago champions, return here with almost the same heavy fighting aggregation that played havoc with all opponents last year, and which defeated Deerfield, 12-0.

Coach Peel's crew was crippled by several losses by graduation, however, the half-dozen or more old men have been used as a nucleus for a sizable squad, in which several new men of mettle will make their first bid for fame Saturday.
