BUDGET IS \$522,650

County Board, Facing Overdraft of \$272,000, Finds Increase Necessary

Before adjourning Friday, the board of supervisors placed the 1926 Lake county appropriation to be levied at \$522,650, or \$5,050 in excess of actual county needs of last year. Further insight into county finances shows the complete list of overdrafts to be \$271,835, of which \$56,000 came in this year's appropriation. A. W. Vercoe, Highland Park, one of the authors of the appropriation, found that it had been exceeded \$50,000 three years ago, \$60,000 two years ago, and \$56,000 this year. Besides that there are overdrafts to be found in the treasurer's office where the county departments have gone to seek-


