LOCAL BOYS MAY WIN FREE TRIP

Local boys and girls are invited to participate in a Miniature Airplane tournament under the auspices of the Miniature Airplane Flyers at the Chicago Municipal Pier on Saturday, September 26, from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. The six best flyers will secure as prizes free airplane trips to New York City to see the International Air races, October 8-10. The two best boys will in addition be entertained free of charge at one of the New York Y. M. C. A.'s, as the guests of the Chicago "Y."

Two boys or girls will be chosen from Class A (experts) who fly indoor duration planes with 36-inch spread; two from Class B (intermediates) with 24-inch or more wingspread, and two from Class C (Beginners) with any kind of a duration plane. For every second that a beginner keeps his miniature plane in flight, he will receive five points. For every second of duration of flight, intermediates will receive 2 1/2 points and experts will receive 2-3 points.

B. F. Pratt Dies Monday at Home of Son; Funeral Services Yesterday

Benjamin Frank Pratt died Monday morning at 7:30 o'clock at the home of his son, E. F. Pratt, on Oakwood avenue, after a short illness which attacked him but the day before, of angina pectoris. He was 78 years of age.

Mr. Pratt was born in Racine, Wis., where he attended school. From Racine he went to Alpena, Mich., to engage in the mercantile business. There he met and married Stella N. Harrington, who survives him. Except for a few years spent in business in Iowa, Mr. and Mrs. Pratt lived in Illinois. Mr. and Mrs. Pratt lived in the past eight years, they have made their home in Highland Park, spending a portion of the time with their daughter in Yonkers, New York.

Surviving Mr. Pratt are his widow, who is 72 years of age; an only son, Elwood F. Pratt, Highland Park business man; and two daughters, Mrs. W. A. Benson, of Yonkers, New York; and Mrs. Cecil Martin, of Lake Forest.

At Alpena, Mr. Pratt was a member of the Episcopal church and a Knight Templar. Funeral services were held yesterday from the home of the son, the Rev. Wolcott, rector of the Highland Park Episcopal church, conducting. The Masonic lodge of Highland Park officiated at the burial in the North Shore cemetery.
