MOOSEHEART LAD HAS EXPENSIVE TEETH
Tommy Smith Is An Example of the Care Given All Mooseheart Charges

Tommy Smith, 15 years of age, from Philadelphia, a student in this Loyal Order of Moose city-home and vocational school, has had dental work done which if paid for at commercial rates would cost at least \$5,000, according to dental surgeons.

Tommy came to Mooseheart several years ago, being eligible after the death of his father. Before having this \$5,000 worth of dental service done he had what are called "peg" teeth. They did not meet for what it known as the "bite" and there was no cutting or chewing surface. When teeth are not used, they decay. His teeth had not reached the stage of decay at the time he was first given service. On account of his teeth not meeting for "the bite" his mouth and face were out of shape.

The chief Mooseheart dentist made a cast of Tommy's mouth and showed it to Directing General James J. Davis, and explained the unusual case. Mr. Davis was so interested in the case of this fatherless boy, that he gave instructions that everything must be done to rebuild this boy's teeth, face and mouth, and he said with emphasis, "Go the limit!"

Then followed conferences of dental surgery experts, and examinations of the boy's teeth. All agreed that it was the first case of the kind known to them. After getting complete history of the case, following a research into the history of the family, they set to work studying the problem. It was decided that the boy's teeth could be built to normal size, and further, that his mouth could be reshaped and also that his face could be reshaped. Surgery work was done to get the bones of the boy's mouth into their proper places. After his mouth was reshaped, every tooth was crowned with porcelain and gold, and built to correct size so that the "bite" was opened a quarter of a inch more than it was before the work was commenced.

In addition to this kind of service he is being given facial athletics, so that all the lines of his face and mouth will be worked into their proper places, which will give him a more natural expression.

Treatment for Four Years
An athletic program has been arranged for him consisting of striking a punching bag, running short distances and other kinds of strenuous exercising for a period of at least four years, to compel him to breathe

through his nose, and in this way strengthen his mouth. This will push his tongue to the roof of his mouth and force his jaws to spread.

He has two brothers and a sister here and their teeth are excellent and they have fine looking faces. This was one reason the dentists had of knowing that Tommy's face and mouth could be reshaped.

If this youth had not been enrolled at Mooseheart, his teeth and mouth would not have been taken care of—the prohibitive cost would have prevented it—he would have shunned society and have become an outcast, on account of his face and mouth being out of shape, and the natural result would have been that he might have drifted toward the path of crime.

Mooseheart service has no limitations. The policy of the Mooseheart governors is that there will be no restrictions as to money or service, if a Mooseheart child has any physical defects, which may be corrected by medical, surgical or dental service.

Fathers who belong to the Loyal Order of Moose buy Mooseheart service for all their children by paying four cents the week. This, in case of death of the father, is complete payment for a home, with every necessity of life provided and also an education until they have completed the high school course, and also have learned a useful trade or vocation.

that it would be selfish to deny a plea for a ride have paid dearly for their beneficence.

"Our courts have held that the operator of a car who invites another to ride with him, is bound to exercise reasonable care for the safety of his guest, and that if, through the driver's negligence, a guest who exercises due care is injured, the driver is liable for damages. If you are the unfortunate victim of a collision in which a boy is hurt, or if he is injured through jumping off the car before it has stopped, or if he is injured while getting off the running board, it may be possible that you will be forced to compensate him.

"It is true that if you contest some of these cases chances are that you would win, but litigation is uncertain and expensive, and in most cases your attorney might accept a settlement by paying a small sum in order to release you from further liability."

STATE TO REGULATE BEAUTY SHOP ETHICS
Governor Small Picks Examining Board; Licensed After Oct. 1

Ethics of the beauty parlor will become a matter of state regulation with the appointment by Gov. Len Small of the Illinois beauty culturists examining board. This board, the fifty-fourth general assembly provided, shall consist of three members of the profession, none of whom shall be connected with a school for beauty, or interested in the manufacture of cosmetics.

Neither shall any two of them be graduates of the same school. This provision was inserted by the legislature in cognizance of the division there is in the profession.

Besides providing who may become a beauty culturist in Illinois, the law provides that the board of examiners shall lay down rules for the conduct of their business. In outlining these rules it is likely the board will have recourse to 43 rules promulgated in the state of Louisiana, many of which may be incorporated in the Illinois rules.

When the last legislature made the beauty culture law, it forgot or neglected to provide funds for its administration, and that includes funds for per diem expense of the examiners. This lack must be cared for in the department of registration and education, out of the general funds provided for this other work.

Must Have Certificates
After October 1, the law says it shall be unlawful for any person to practice beauty culture without a

certificate as registered beauty culturist. Neither shall any person attempt to serve as an apprentice in a beauty parlor without a certificate as registered apprentice.

The law defines beauty culture as follows: "Any one or any combination of the following practices constitutes the practice of beauty culture when done for cosmetic or beautifying purposes and not for the treatment of disease or of muscular or nervous disorder.

"The application of cosmetic preparation to the human body by massaging, stroking, kneading, slapping, tapping, stimulating, exercising, manipulating, cleansing, beautifying or by any means of devices, apparatus or appliances; arranging, dressing, marcelling, curling, waving, cleansing, singeing, bleaching, coloring, dyeing, tinting, or otherwise treating by any means the hair of any person. However the provisions of this act shall not authorize any registered beauty culturist to cut or clip the hair of any person unless she has at first obtained the certificate of registration as a barber."
