TOO MANY SOLDIERS ABOUT "NEW HOME"

Police Get Letter from Mother in Bavaria Inquiring About Daughter

When Miss Dora Reiner, employed at the home of H. Heine, Green Bay road, sent a post card picture of Fort Sheridan back to her mother in Bavaria, with the information to the effect that this was a view of her "new home in America," the mother became alarmed and straightway wrote a letter to the Highland Park police department describing the girl and asking as to her welfare. Chief Moroney obtained assistance of an expert in German script who translated the epistle, and the police proceeded to look up the girl, whom they found safe and sound at the Heine home, as the latter had indicated. Probably what the girl meant in her message on the card was that it was a picture of some of the surroundings of her home in U. S., but because the card showed several hundreds of soldiers about the barracks, the good mother evidently was worried.
