FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IS OBSERVED

LOSS IS HUGE ANNUALLY

Statistics Show That Each Day In This Country 41 Die And Over Million Is Damage by Fire

Lois Larson will speak on "How to Prevent Fires in Home and School." Brainerd Chapman will have for subject, "What to Do in Case of Fire." Chief Hoskin will demonstrate the use of the pulmotor in resuscitation work and the firemen will demonstrate the use of various apparatus used in fighting fires in a special exhibition to be staged outside the assembly hall.

The following statement embracing the chief dangers to guard against in the matter of fire is furnished by Chief Hoskin:

Chief Issues Statement

"Fire is costly carelessness. It will require both individual and collective effort to avert general fire losses. Individually we can make a start by developing in ourselves a fire conscientiousness. We can make a carefulness with fire not simply a habit but an ingrained instinct, what we term sometimes second nature. First all persons should learn to identify, then to remove or correct those conditions in our own premises, home or business which breeds palpably dangerous conditions such as rubbish heaps. The thoughtlessly disposed match or cigarette, the electric pressing iron needlessly left turned on, the defective chimney or flue, the disposal of oily rags, the open fire left untended—all are common hazards. If every citizen will make an inspection of his home and place of business and look for hazards, and remove them—if we do this—we will be doing a good job collectively for ourselves and for our city and our country. In calling the fire department always remember to take the receiver from the hook and ask for H. P. 59, fire department and when the fire department answers give them the house number and name of the street. Do not take the receiver from the hook and shout fire, and leave the telephone. Your operator can not distinguish from what home the fire call is sent, and a serious fire may result from carelessness on the part of the party sending in the call. Always remember to stay on the telephone until you are connected with the fire department.

Boy Scouts to Aid

The Boy Scouts of the Highland Park Council have been given a real place in the fire prevention week program of October 4th to 10th.

Fire Chief E. C. Hoskin of Highland Park is very enthusiastic about participation of the scouts, and agreed to do everything within his power to help make fire prevention week a week of real service by the scouts.

Scouts have already distributed poster and proclamations on fire prevention week and will assist the fire department still further.

Fire Chief to Inspect School

Chief Hoskin on October 5, inspected the public schools of Highland Park, accompanied by two picked scouts from each school. The school principals appointed these two boys for the duty, and Chief Hoskin appointed one of them as a volunteer fire marshal for his school. This boy will make reports on conditions and on fire hazards in his school to his principal. Once a month he will give a report to the scout executive who will forward it to the fire chief. This report will contain an outline of conditions as he found and reporters and proclamations on fire prevention and a report of action taken by the school authorities.

Boy Scout Day

Wednesday, October 7, was boy scout day of fire prevention week. The fire house was open to boy scouts all day, and at 4 p. m. all the scouts of the council were invited to meet at the fire house to inspect and learn all about the fire apparatus. Chief Hoskin and other firemen were on hand to explain everything about fire fighting to the boys.

Chief Hoskin suggested also, that the boys who accompanied him on his inspection of the schools be allowed to explain in the next school assembly what they saw and learned in regard to fires and fire hazards on their inspection trip.

Chief Hoskin is sending for a large number of "home inspection" questionnaires published by the Underwriters' Laboratories and expects to have the boy scouts deliver them to the older children in school, so that ideas on the preparation of the average home for fire may be gained by the fire department.

Every boy scout troop in the council will receive a visit, during fire prevention week on its troop meeting nights, from Fire Chief Hoskin, who will speak to the boys on firemanship and on fire prevention. In addition to this, Chief Hoskin has agreed to instruct and act as expert examiner for the court of honor on the merit badge in firemanship.

All a pedestrian has to do now, is to look both ways, then look over his shoulder for cars making a right turn, and to the opposite corner for left turn cars, and do the whole thing in one instant of time.
