The three upper grades are now being operated under the alternating supervised study system. This means that only one-half of the subjects are taught and studied each day, but for a double period of time. For example, Monday-Arithmetic, 1 hour; reading, 1 hour; hygiene, 1 hour; spelling, 1-2 hour; music, 1-2 hour; study, 40 minutes. Tuesday-History, 1 hour; English, 1 hour; geography, 1 hour; penmanship, 1-2 hour; art, 1-2 hour; tudy, 40 minutes.

This system proves to be very advantageous as there is no time wasted, makes supervised study possible and effective, reduces home work for pupils, gives plenty time to complete a subject, makes pupils learning easier, and the teachers time is spent in teaching, not "hearing recitations."

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
