**Deerfield Grammar School**

There was a county teacher's meeting at Waukegan last Saturday, at which the following were present: Miss Yahn, Miss Lidgerwood, Miss Ethel Titus, Miss Mae Titus, Miss Nygard, Mrs. Woods and Mr. Otto.

All mothers invited to come next Friday at the school, to the parents and teachers meeting. There will be a program by the fourth grade pupils, "Recreation." The papers will be by Mrs. B. F. Langworthy, read by Mrs. J. A. Reichelt, Jr.

About seventy-five pupils are taking milk, and the number is increasing rapidly.

The three upper grades are now being operated under the alternating supervised study system. This means that only one-half of the subjects are taught and studied each day, but for a double period of time. For example, Monday—Arithmetic, 1 hour; reading, 1 hour; hygiene, 1 hour; spelling, 1-2 hour; music, 1-2 hour; study, 40 minutes. Tuesday—History, 1 hour; English, 1 hour; geography, 1 hour; penmanship, 1-2 hour; art, 1-2 hour; study, 40 minutes.

This system proves to be very advantageous as there is no time wasted, makes supervised study possible and effective, reduces home work for pupils, gives plenty time to complete a subject, makes pupils learning easier, and the teachers time is spent in teaching, not "hearing recitations."

**BOY SCOUTS COURT OF HONOR MEETING**

Several Members of Troops are Advanced to Higher Places in Organizations

**Physical Training Course**

A training course for Boy Scout patrol leaders has been started and will meet every Tuesday night. Every patrol leader, senior patrol leader, and scribe, is eligible for attendance. Scoutmasters may appoint scouts whom they think are specially fitted for leadership for attendance at the meetings.

The course will be of eight sessions, six evenings of study and practical application of principles learned, one overnight hike to Camp Millard, and one evening of examination on points covered by the course.

A certificate will be given to scouts who satisfactorily complete the course. It is expected that after the first of the year every senior patrol leader, patrol leader and scribe, will hold a training certificate.
