300 New Members Can Be Admitted; Members Only to See Performances

Local Publisher Is Speaker at Illinois Press Assn. Meeting

Among Illinois publishers who participated in the program at the annual meeting of the Illinois Press association, held in Champaign Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week, was John L. Udell, president of the Udell Printing Co. of Highland Park and Lake Forest, was a speaker at the Friday morning session on the subject, "Building Up a Weekly Newspaper." Several other editors discussed this subject also, and it was one of the most interesting features of the three days' meeting.

Oswald Garrison Villard, editor of The Nation Magazine gave a fine address on "The Newspaper and Its Relation to the Government." Edward Price Bell of the Chicago Daily News spoke on the "Life and Work of Victor F. Lawson." The man who is generally thought of as the biggest small town merchant was there and told the newspaper-folks how, through judicious advertising in the rural press, he has built from a small beginning what is today one of the largest small town department stores in America. He is Fred P. Mann, Sr., of Devil's Lake, North Dakota. He talked on "Uses of Advertising in Building Business in a Small Town."

O. Lawrence Hawthorne, "the newspaper poet and philosopher," formerly in newspaper work in Illinois but now residing in Omaha, Neb., was also on one of the programs and read several of his works. The president of the New England Daily Press association, James T. Murray of New Bedford, Mass., John L. Stewart, president of the Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers association of Washington, Pa., and J. W. Shaw of Elmira, N. Y., secretary of the New York Press association were other out-of-state speakers appearing on the program.

Special sessions for both the daily and weekly press, a department for women, and a session for editorial writers were features of the meeting this year.

W. J. Smith of Waukegan, Ill., was elected president; H. G. Fell of White Hall, first vice-president; A. L. Bowen of Springfield, second vice-president, and H. L. Williamson, also of Springfield, executive secretary.

SECURE GOOD TRAINS FOR HIGHLAND PARK
Committee Reports Excellent Results as Result of Its Work
Effective work on the part of the committee appointed by the mayor and city council to take up with the Northwestern Railroad company the matter of better train service for Highland Park has resulted in securing for this city a good train to Chicago leaving here at 12:02 noon, and arriving in Chicago at 12:45, and the committee urges that Highland Park-

ers make use of this train rather than the 12:53, in order that it may be retained permanently. The committee also obtained the restoration of the after-theatre train, leaving Chicago at 11:30 p. m. and making much better time than the 11:35. For the train leaving Chicago at 5:50 p. m. also it was possible to get much better equipment, with steel cars, and excellent lighting facilities. The committee will continue to work for the best interest of Highland Park in the matter of good train service. It is composed of George H. Dunscomb, chairman; Clarence H.
