from his post for several hours. The dog was not confined in any way and his leash was found buried under the white flakes beside the neckpiece.

Mrs. Stewart, who was 47 years old went to the extensive kennels she and her husband maintain at their home, 616 Forest avenue, about 4:30 p. m. She told Tom Gately, the kennel man, that she wanted to take Tiny, a great favorite of hers, out for an airing.

Gately said he did not notice anything unusual in the bearing of Mrs. Stewart as she left.

Mr. Stewart declined to discuss whether his wife had been despondent.

"I called her about four o'clock from the city," he told reporters. "She was all right then. When I got home she failed to meet me as usual. This was so unusual — she hadn't failed to meet me once in 20 years."

From other sources the police learned that Mrs. Stewart had been seriously ill with influenza last winter and had never fully recovered.

After Tiny had been discovered by Policeman Kopp, he seemed to think that his vigil had ended. He started for home and was run over and killed by an automobile on Sheridan road, near the Stewart residence. Many of the dogs owned by Mr. and Mrs. Stewart have been prize winners both in this country and abroad.

A sister of Mrs. Stewart, Mrs. William Anderson, resides on Sheridan place and a niece, Mrs. E. E. Gibbs, is a resident of Ravinia.

The relatives have the deep sympathy of the community in their sudden and sad bereavement.

An inquest was held last evening at the H. M. Prior Co.'s office by Coroner Taylor, the verdict of the jury being that of suicide while despondent over ill health.
