Next Sunday the entire collection taken up in the Sunday school will be given to the piano fund.

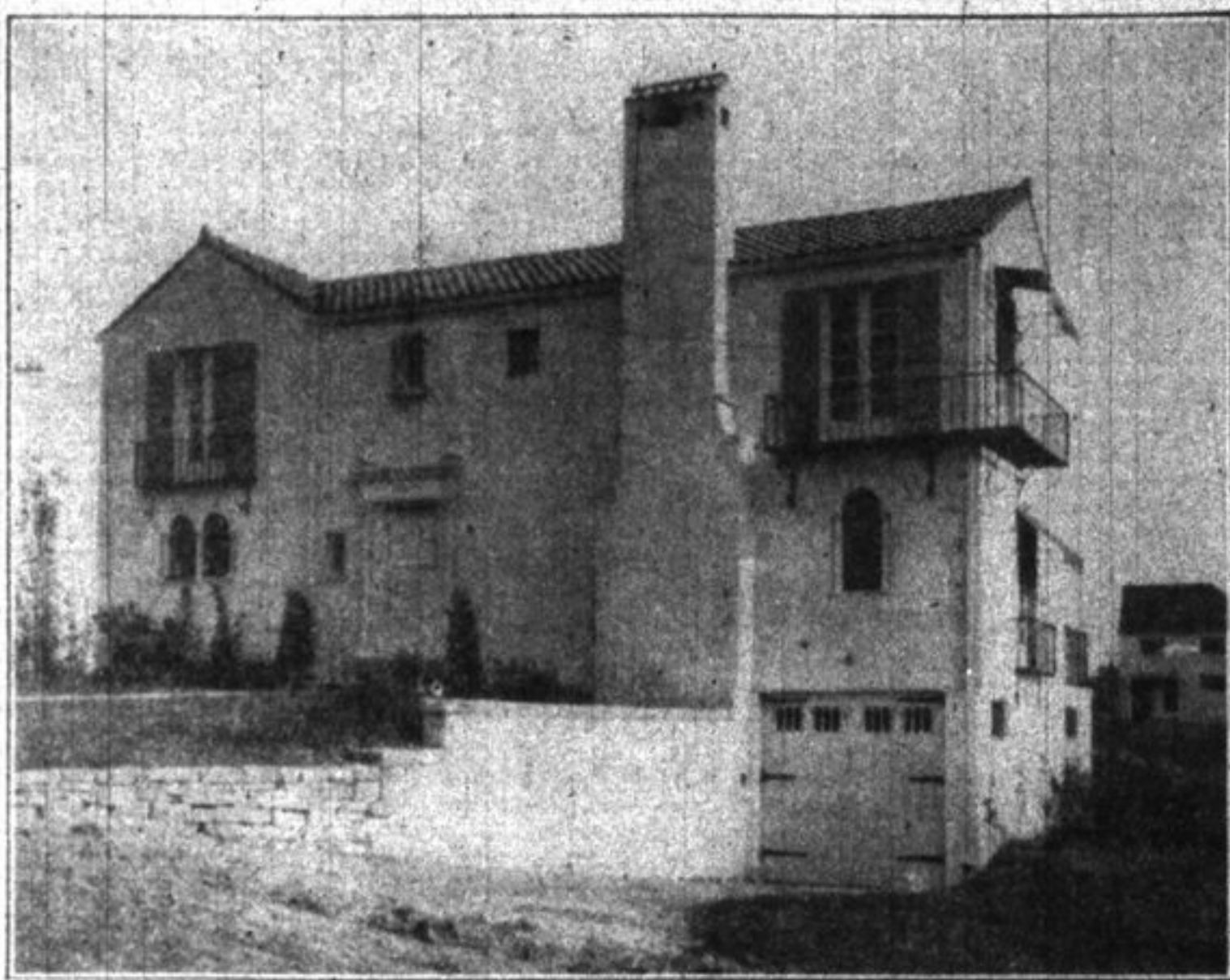
The teachers and officers of the Sunday school will meet in the Sunday school rooms Friday evening at 7:30 sharp.

A modern home in which electricity will do practically all of the household work will be opened Saturday, October 31st at two p. m., at 1502 S. Green Bay road, by the North Shore Electric League.

An invitation is extended to the general public to visit this electric home during the exhibition which will continue for approximately two weeks.

The rich beauty of old Spanish architecture combined with ultra modernness of the twentieth century are strikingly apparent in the Highland Park electric home.

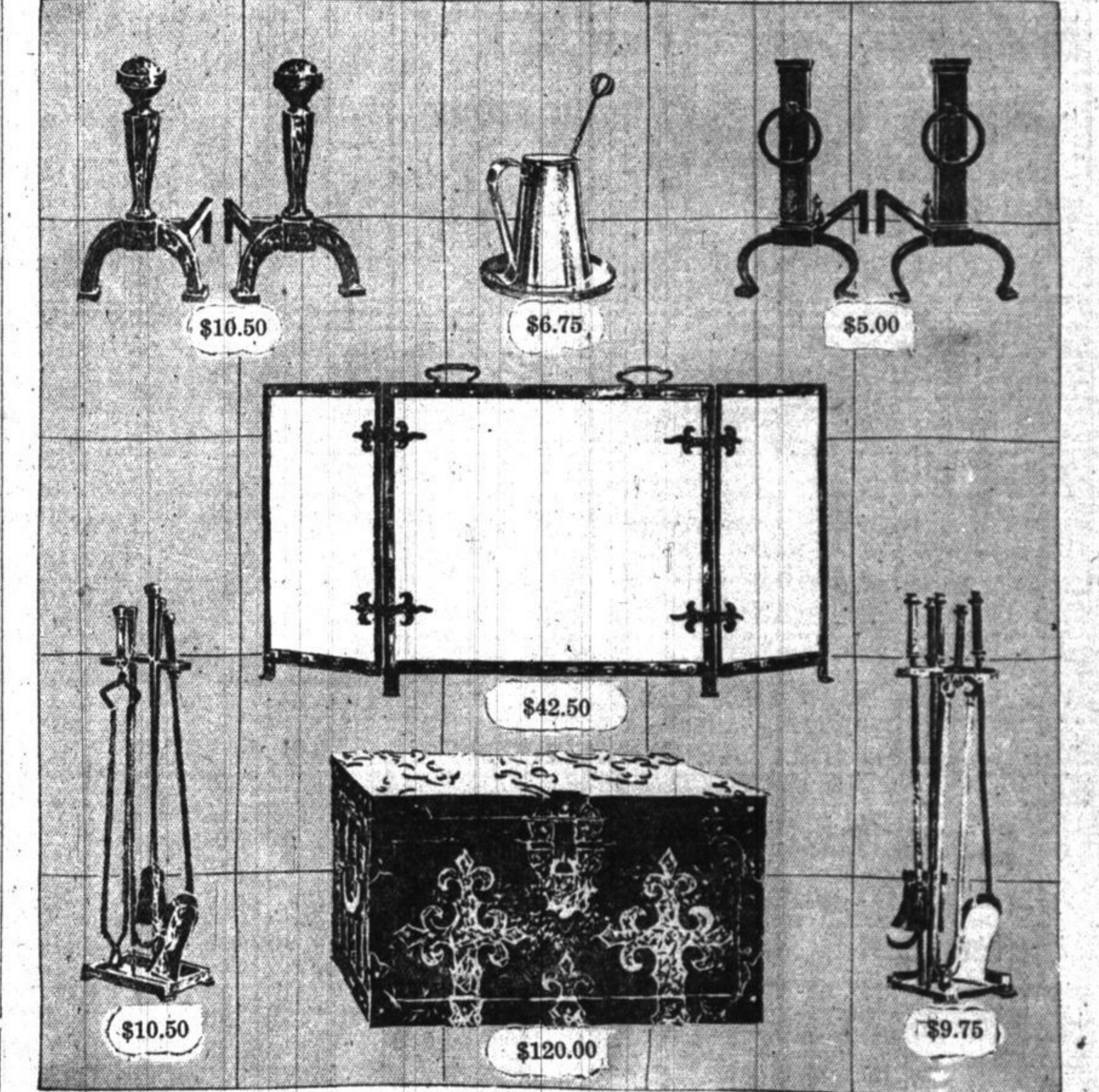
