

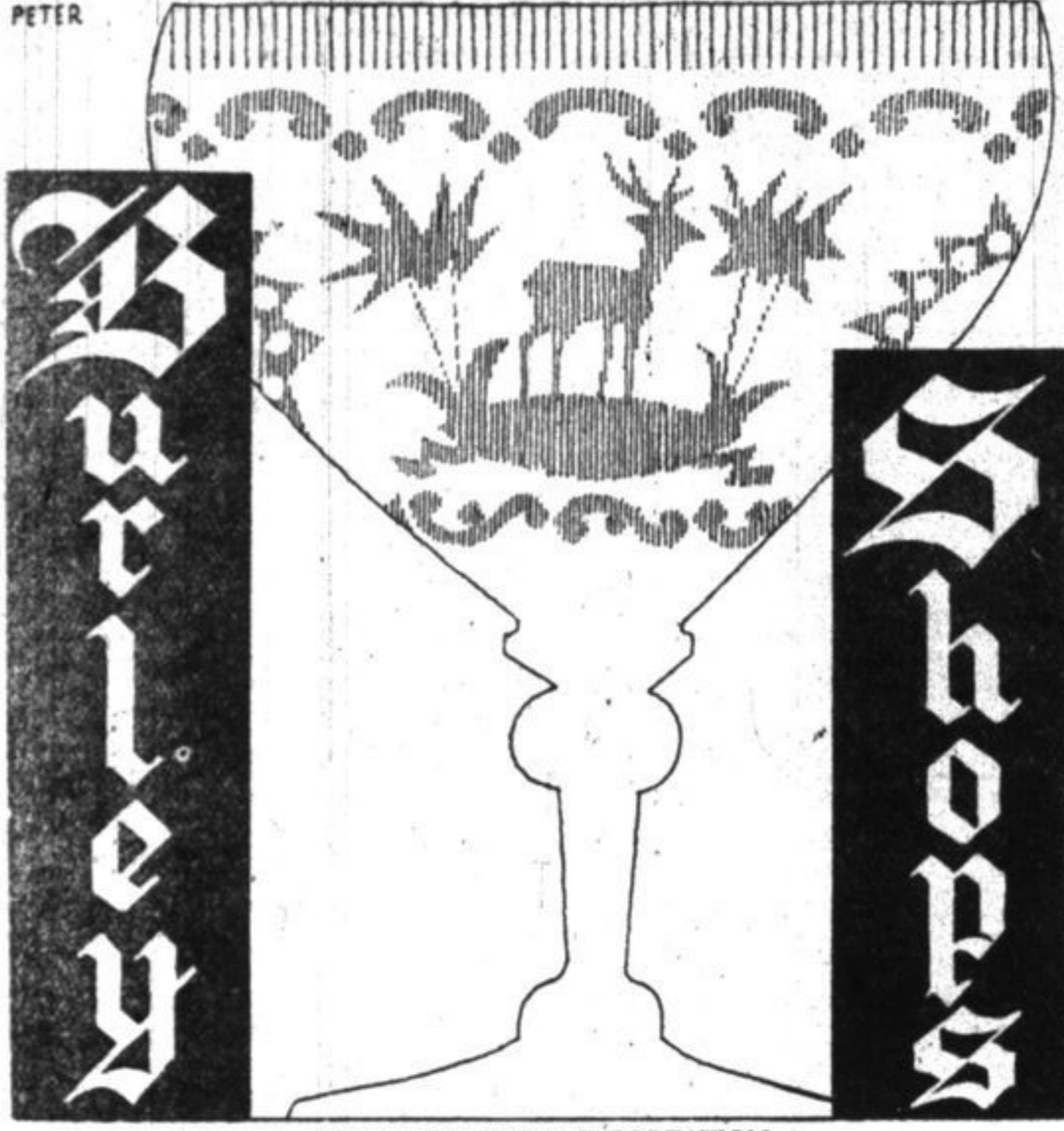

GLENCOE MAN HEADS CHICAGO MOOSE LODGE

Dr. W. E. Buehler of That Place Installed Dictator on Last Sunday

Dr. W. E. ARE PROBING SPEED TRAP AT WINNETKA

Committee Appointed to Investigate Alleged Irregularities Works Hard

Investigation of charges made against the Winnetka police department recently is going steadily forward, it was announced at the Village hall last week. The special investigating committee, of nine villagers which was appointed by Village President John S. Miller, Jr., has been meeting nearly every night and the Village council was informed at its meeting last week that considerable testimony has been taken. At the meeting of the council three weeks ago the sum of \$1,000 was appropriated for the purpose of providing a competent attorney and a short-hand stenographer for the use of the committee. Frederick Mason was the attorney appointed. It is expected that the investigating committee will conclude its work within the next week or so and its recommendations will then be given to the Village council which will take such action as it sees fit.

SELECT JUDGES FOR DEPOT NAME CONTEST

NEW SKOKIE VALLEY ROAD

Prominent Men Chosen to Decide Winners Who Submit Suggestions; Progress Being Made

Judges to select names for the nine stations along the new Skokie Valley Route of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad—the North Shore Line—from those submitted in connection with the \$1,000 award contest recently inaugurated, were announced by the company as follows: S. Charles Iversen, president of the Chicago Real Estate board; William L. Bailey, professor of sociology, Northwestern university; Frederick Rex, municipal reference librarian of the city of Chicago; Miss Caroline McIlvaine, librarian of the Chicago Historical society; Daniel H. Burnham, president of the Chicago regional plan commission.

Closes December 1

At the time of giving out the official sites for the new stations recently, the North Shore Line announced that \$100 would be awarded for the most appropriate name suggested for each of the nine stations, and \$100 for the name adjudged the best among all those submitted. The contest which is open to the general public, will close December 1. The names of the winners will be given out December 15.

The aim of the contest is to secure names to be used in conjunction with the names of the North Shore suburbs through which the Skokie Valley route passes, so as to distinguish the new stations from those on the Shore Line route. These suburbs are Evanston, Winnetka, Glencoe, Highland Park and Lake Forest.

Good Progress

Construction work on the new project continues at record-breaking pace. Figures given out by the North Shore Line today show that a total of 22 miles—or 60 per cent of the 36 miles of track included in the Skokie Valley route proper, had been laid on October 20. This is eight miles more track than the total laid a month ago. A total of 40,000 cubic yards of ballast and over 350,000 cubic yards of grading material has been moved from the pits near Libertyville and placed on the track.

Preliminary work on installation of the catenary construction has started, 250 concrete foundations for steel trolley poles having already been poured. This work will be completed in time to permit uninterrupted progress on overhead construction work during the winter months.

Every indication is that the new route will be completed and in operation at an earlier date next spring than originally anticipated.

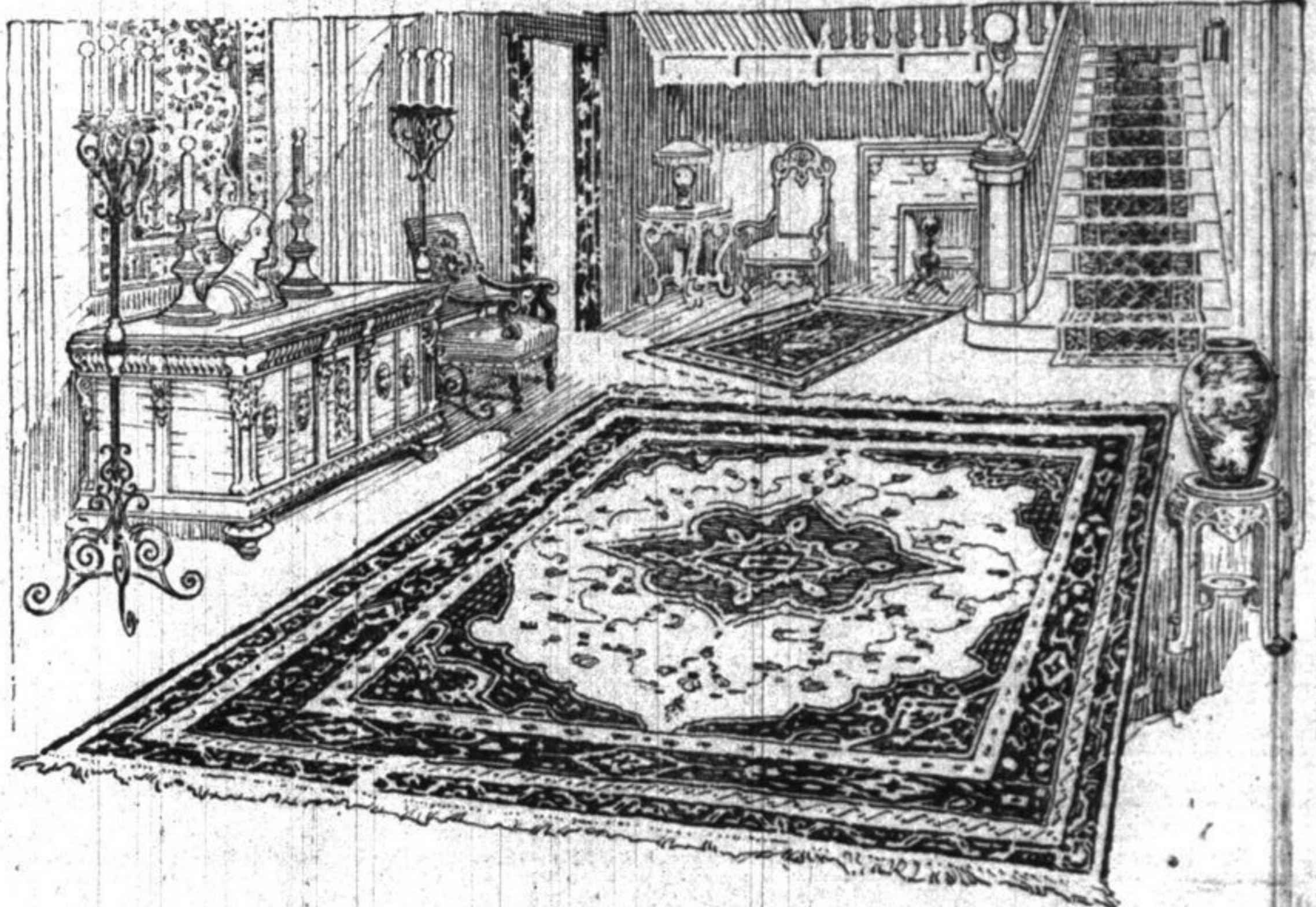
THROUGH WEST ROAD AT GLENCOE PLANNED

Board of Local Improvements Is Considering Street West From Sheridan

Discussion of plans to develop a through traffic route from Sheridan road west through Glencoe, by the board of local improvements of that place, at its meeting last Friday evening, resulted in a motion, being passed to secure an estimate of the cost of such an improvement. The highway, as planned, would extend from the intersection of Skokie road and Greenwood avenue eastward, and cross the Chicago and North Western railroad and North Shore line tracks at Lincoln avenue bearing to the south and passing between lots 16 and 17, Owner's subdivision, and terminating at Sheridan road.

This is in line with the policy of Village officials to provide adequate through traffic routes in the village so that the flow of traffic is not slowed down. The proposed route would connect Sheridan road with Dundee road, a concrete highway intersecting both Waukegan and Milwaukee roads, as well as Rand road. Dundee road is an important link in the state system of highways and connects with roads leading to nearly every town in the northwestern portion of the state.
