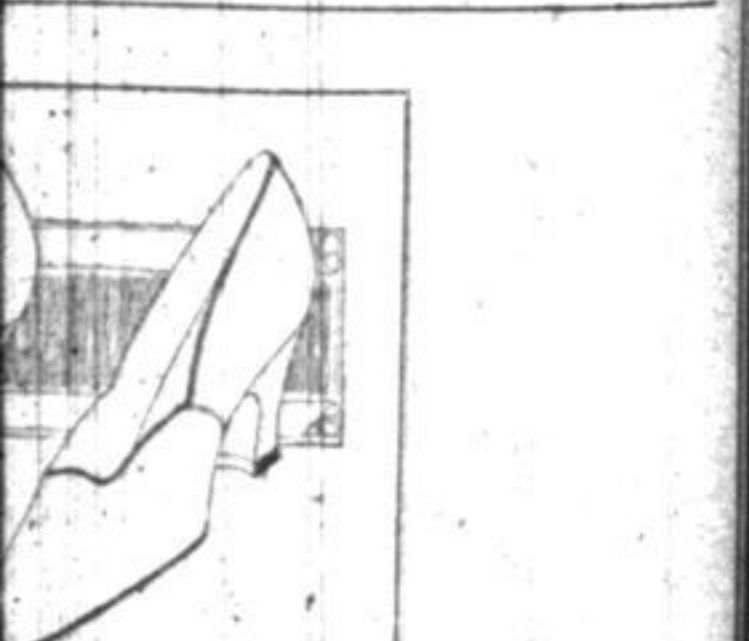
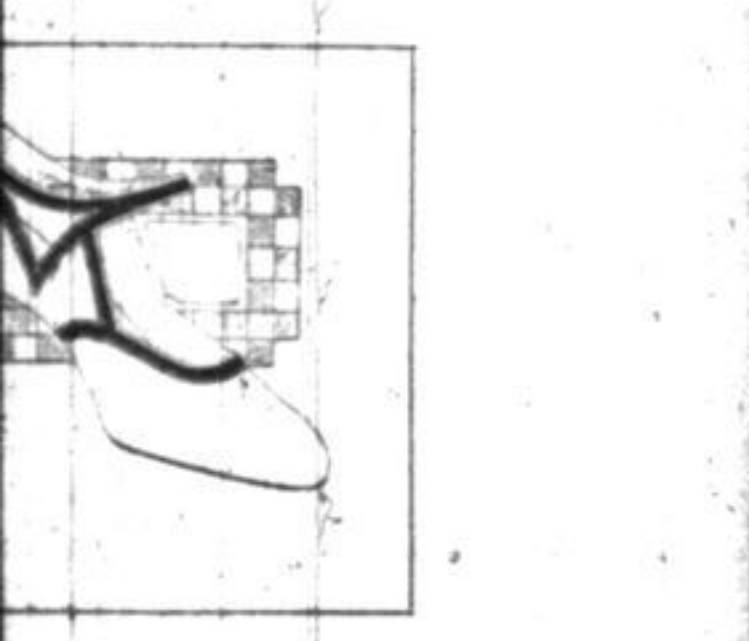

Conditions Tells His Experiences
in U. S. and Abroad;
Knows His Subject

Last Tuesday evening the Highland Park Woman's Club opened its doors to the public, and announced an open meeting that all the people of this city might avail themselves of the opportunity to hear Whiting Williams.

For the past several years, this man, a practical student of sociology and economics, has worked at common labor in some of the leading coal mines of the United States and Europe, for the purpose of forming his own estimate of the miner, studying his attitude of mind, and the living conditions under which he exists. In doing this, Mr. Williams put himself on a basis of economic equality with the men, sharing with them the

Schuman-Heink Sings Here Nov. 16; First Of Concert Series

Mme. Schumann-Heink comes to Highland Park to appear in concert at the high school auditorium, Monday evening, Nov. 16.

This simple announcement, with change of place and date, would be news in any town, or city almost in the world. Particularly is it news anywhere in the United States.

No other of her time has been delighting the public for so long a time—forty-seven years this season. Over such a period, no other singer has been so acclaimed, no other voice has gained, instead of lost, so steadily in power and authority.

Sixty-five years ago, when Lincoln made the great decision that first was to rend and then after a bitter struggle wend this country firmly together, there was born in Austria a girl baby who was to become the greatest of contraltos. Her father was a Bohemian, a poorly paid officer in the Austrian army. Her mother was an Italian.

She was placed in the Ursuline convent in Prague and there, when she was twelve, a nun discovered that she had a remarkable voice. She was permitted to sing in the Cathedral. Her family moved to Graz, where Excellence Benedek, a well-to-do army officer became interested and provided funds for lessons until she was seventeen. Then he sent her to the director of the Hof Opera in Vienna. He told her that "with such a face and no personality she could never hope to be a singer."

Then began the struggle through which every great artist has gone, until she received an invitation to sing in the Royal Opera at Dresden. She remained there for four years, being married in the third, and then progressed to Hamburg. Her husband died there, leaving her with five children and pitifully small pay.

ALCYON AND PEARL THEATRES LEASED

NEW MANAGEMENT BEGINS

Both Houses Now Operated by the Carl Laemmle Interests and Present Personnel Is Retained

William Pearl, who has been in the theatre business in Highland Park for thirteen years or more and one of the pioneers in the motion picture line in Chicago and vicinity, has leased, for a long term, his two theatres here and will for the present retire from active management.

The handsome new Alcyon theatre on Central avenue, east, recently erected, and the older Pearl theatre, on First street, have been rented by the Carl Laemmle interests at a handsome monthly rental, it is understood. Mr. Laemmle is president of the Universal Pictures corporation, but it is expressly explained by those interested that the Universal company is not the purchaser, the deal being of a personal nature and will add the local theatres to a chain already controlled by the Laemmle interests, in which a brother is associated with him.

Personnel Unchanged
It is also stated that the present personnel of the theatres will be retained for the present. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sleybaeh will remain at the Alcyon, the former as manager and the latter in charge of advertising and ticket sales, as formerly, and

NORTH SHORE TRUST PLANS IMPROVEMENT

SPACE TO BE INCREASED

Will Enlarge to Include Reading Room on West and Entire Property to Be Remodelled

Extensive improvements are planned by the North Shore Trust company by which its banking house at the corner of Central avenue and Sheridan road, in the Sheridan building, owned by the company, will be greatly enlarged and remodelled to accommodate its rapidly increasing business.

The bank will include in its precincts the room just west of the present quarters, which has been leased for the past ten or twelve years by the First Church of Christ Scientist as a reading room. The reading room is to be removed, it is planned, to the commodious and attractive room on the second floor, front, of the new Alcyon theatre. The reading room's lease of the present quarters does not expire until next April, but by mutual agreement between its management and the North Shore Trust company the lease is to be released at the end of this year.

Plans to Be Drawn
In the meantime the banking company will have a firm of architects at work preparing plans for the enlarging and remodeling of the banking house. At present these plans are tentative, but the purpose is to remove entirely the partition between the bank and the reading room, to include
