BLACKJACKETS LOSE TO HIGHWOOD TEAM

Fast South Side Bunch Drops Game to North Shore Team, 19 to 6

Highwood defeated the heavy Blackjackets from Chicago's south side, Sunday at Highwood field, 19-6, in what was without a doubt the best and hardest fought game ever played in Highwood. The score was 19 to 6.

The visitors outweighed Highwood about 15 pounds to the man. Pierce, their center and captain, weighed 260 pounds and played a year with the Chicago Bears.

First quarter. Highwood kicked off to the visitors; they smashed and tore through the lighter Highwood line for gain after gain, the locals held on the 10 yard line, Blackjackets completed a pass for a touchdown and failed to kick. Highwood received but was unable to penetrate the visitors' line. Score, 6 to 0.

Second quarter. A beautiful punt by Shannon was downed on the visitors' 5 yard line, an end run by the Chicago quarter around the right end for 95 yards, but he was called back and the visitors penalized for slugging in the line. Les Allen tore thru the right tackle for a big gain and Bellei went across. Score, 6 to 0, but still Chicago's round.

Third quarter. Coach Bolan's outfit came out on the field full of fight. The Blackjackets carried the ball to Highwood's four yard line. 1st down and goal to go the locals were penalized for off side, 1st down and 2 yards to go or a touchdown, Highwood's fighting line led by Lauridsen and Williams held the heavier Blackjackets for 4 downs on the one yard line.

The tide of the battle turned, Shannon punted out, Highwood held for downs and got the ball about the 40 yard line, Stewart and Allen skirted the ends, scampered through tackle and showed the visitors their heels, on the 10 yard line Fink threw a fine one to Robinson who raced across. Highwood failed to kick. Score, 12 to 6.

Fourth quarter. This round was Highwood's. They showed the visitors more fight and football than ordinarily can be gotten together in a small town. Everyone on Highwood's team played a wonderful game. Highwood took the ball the full length of the field and on another neat pass, Fink to Robinson, netted 6 points. Highwood booted it over. Score 19 to 6.
