common lot of deprivation, sordid living, jobless periods, and the sequential days of near starvation.

Knows His Subject

In his talk last Tuesday evening, he showed how the "job" is the working man's life, the conditions and code of which control his entire social conduct. He declared that a man lives his way into his thinking, rather than thinks his way into his living. He explained, in a very graphic and convincing manner, the natural pride in craftsmanship which every laborer feels, and, dropping lower in the scale of ability, showed also the natural pride which the common or unskilled laborer feels in his work. In other words, he demonstrated that "pride in his own unique contribution" to the economic order constituted the "mainsprings of men" which was the subject of his lecture, as well as the title of his new book shortly to be off the press.

Vast Discrepancy

He spoke of the vast discrepancy between the skilled laborer, and the unskilled, but declared that a vast gulf lay between the jobless man and the man with a job. His little sociological study of the gradations of the social status, created by a difference of two or three pennies an hour, more or less, in the pay-check, served as a kind of humorous primer in social evolutions, and the child-like manner by which they were formed.

Altogether, it was a most salutary eye-opening glimpse into the lives of these men who carry the heaviest burden of the economic order under which we live; whose lives when studied at first hand, present precisely the same prides and problems, prejudices an phenomena, as those of any other rank whatsoever.

Makes Careful Study

In short, Whiting Williams's lecture was an hour's careful study in the "mainsprings" of all men, in the common lot. Besides that, it was an inspiring revelation to all who heard him, and a sharp incentive for them to know more, to work out of the sequestered pools of thought, as it were, and get into the running stream.

stall an entire new front and to wholly remodel the interior for banking purposes.

The present intention of the bank is to retain its corner entrance, which is wide and adequate and well located. It is also planned to retain the present fixtures in as far as they can be utilized and to maintain the same style and finish of woodwork in the enlarged quarters. Work will not begin until after the first of the year, and by that time definite plans and specifications will be prepared, the cashier, Mrs. E. J. Grundy, explained.

Much Additional Space

This will give the bank additional space of about 25 by 60 feet which has been much needed, as the present quarters have become crowded of late because of the steadily increasing business of the company, whose capital is \$100,000 and whose surplus has steadily gained until it is now \$75,000. Its general banking business has been showing a healthy growth for a long time as well as its real estate loan business, and the need of greater space has been felt for some time. Now that satisfactory arrangements have been made by which the bank may secure the adjoining room in its building, there is no longer need for delay in planning the extension, and the work will go forward as soon as the room is vacant. The new improvement in the bank building will be another fine addition to the business district and a credit to this rapidly growing community.

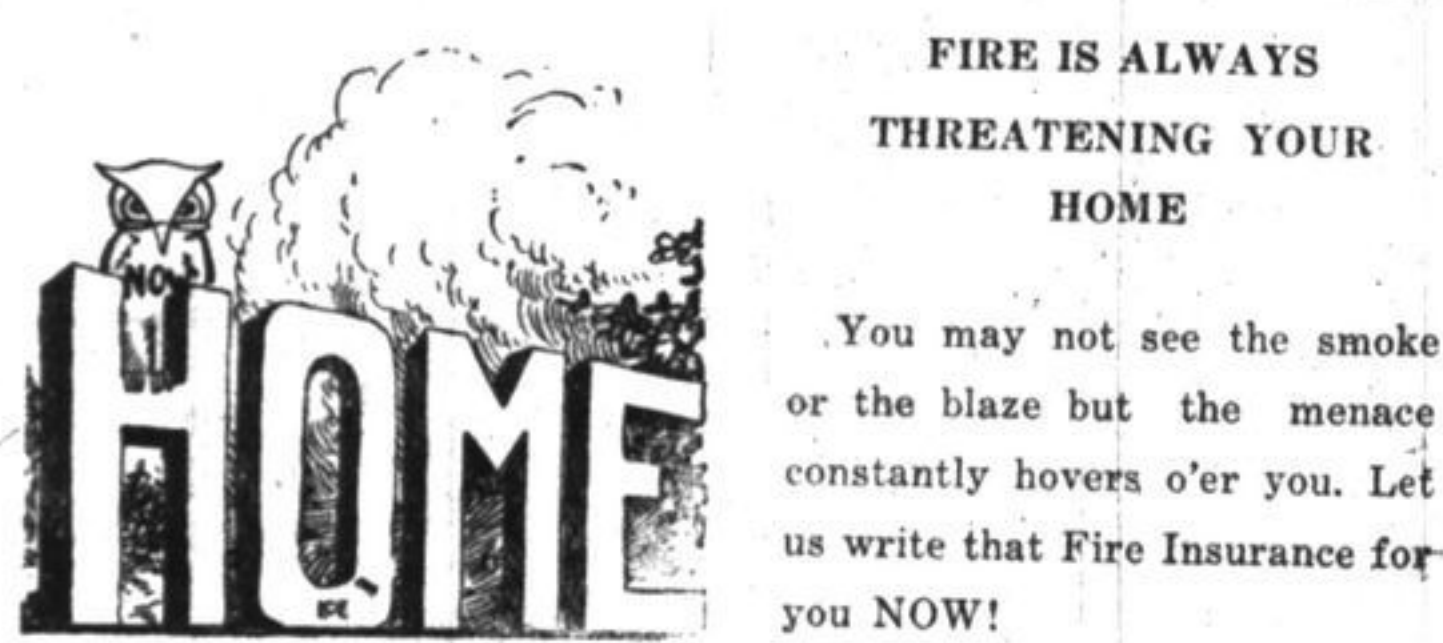
