"Wild Geese" is a story of power. The power of Nature over men, the power of one's acts over one's self. the power of one human being over

Up in the stern relentless country of the Northwest there is little that softens or beautifies human nature. The struggle for existence is so cruel that men become numb to all other things than the unrelenting demands of the soil. The feeling for Nature has the deep and primitive quality which marks the best of the Norwegians from whose race Martha Ostenso is sprung.


