A group of Negro Spirituals by Mrs. Byfield in her own inimitable way, "Run, Mary, Run," advice on a new way of sliding into heaven, "Morning Dove," giving four different moods in the four verses, which was unusual and just the way we have all felt at times, and the last of the group "Lil David."

## ERECTING BUILDING FOR HIGHWOOD BANK

On J. J. Flannigan Property, on Railroad Avenue; Other New Structures

Building operations at Highwood are booming. The new bank building which is being erected by J. J. Flannigan, just south of his other buildings on Railroad avenue, for the use of the new state bank of Highwood, which it is expected will soon be formally launched, is progressing.

The basement is excavated and the vault is under construction. It will be of one story and about 85 feet deep with frontage of about 27 feet. It will be modern equipped and furnished.

Permit for sale of the bank stock has been received from the state secretary and stock is selling well. It is expected that soon a meeting will be held to apply for a charter, and formal organization will follow.

On the west side of Waukegan avenue a building to accommodate two stores and apartments above is in course of erection, and another store and flat building is being built on Railroad avenue.

## BUSINESS CHANGES AND NEW BUILDINGS

### SPRINGER - PERSON FIRM

Former to Continue Ford and Lincoln Business; Latter Takes Hudson-Essex; Improvements

Important change in the firm of Springer and Person is reported this week, and several other business changes consisting chiefly of occupation of new quarters in the near future and the erection of new buildings show increased activity in business and building lines of this city.

The change in the Springer & Person company consists in a separation of interests. O. S. Springer is taking over the interests of A. W. Springer in the Ford and Lincoln sales and service business and will continue that business at the present location. What the firm name will be is not definitely decided.

Takes Hudson Agency A. W. Person will assume the local agency for the Hudson and Essex automobiles and will be located in the building at the corner of Laurel avenue and Second street, in the building now occupied by the North Shore Buick company. He expects to open about December 1, if the building is available.

The North Shore Buick concern is erecting a commodious building to contain sales room and garage on First street, south of the George H. Koon garage. The new building is about 100 by 50 feet and of one story. The shop section will be ready for use about Jan. 1, it is reported, and the show room later.

### Other New Buildings

Frank Slijestrom is building a new office building for his ice and coal business on North First street. It is about 34 by 20 feet in dimensions and will be modernly equipped.

Another new building on North First street is being erected by Fred Lindstrom. It also is of one story and will be occupied by Henry Winter's tin shop.

The new additions to the Loeb building on North First street is near completion, and two of the store rooms will be occupied by the variety store owned and operated by Jacob L. Crane, Sr.

### Tone Stores Leased

The stores in the new Tone building on Central avenue, opposite the office of the Highland Park Press are nearly all rented. The store room at the west end of the building is occupied by George Lallah with a notion store. Gus Athanas' North Shore grocery occupies the middle room. The next room east will be occupied by Elmer McLaughlin with a men's furnishing store, and the east end room will house a drug store to be conducted by Vernon McMahon, who comes from Libertyville, it is understood. Negotiations are under way for lease of the fifth store room, and the sixth is yet to be rented. F. B. Williams is the agent.

A new building is being erected on Waukegan avenue, just north of the Bloom street viaduct. It is understood that it will be occupied by a plumbing firm from Winnetka.

### MRS. CORNELL, WIFE OF GLENCOE PASTOR, DIES

Death Quite Sudden Wednesday Morning; Funeral Probably Saturday P. M.

Mrs. Alice Ellery Cornell, wife of the Rev. Douglas Hawley Cornell, pastor of the Union church of Glencoe, died at her home in that village early yesterday. She was aged fifty-five years. Illness was brief, and the community is shocked at the passing of this well-known and highly esteemed woman.

Dr. Cornell and three daughters survive, and they have the deep sympathy of the entire North Shore in their sudden and sad bereavement. The funeral services probably will be held on Saturday afternoon.

### NORTH SHORE TRUST TO INCREASE BOARD

Number of Directors to Be Seven, Instead of Five; Dooley a Vice-President

At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the North Shore Trust company, held October 20, a resolution was adopted increasing the number of directors from five to seven. The change will take effect at the beginning of the fiscal year in January. William M. Dooley will be vice-president in charge of the commercial end of the bank's business and his duties will be to increase deposits, etc. The bank is planning to enlarge its quarters and general increase in business is expected.
