**Resident Here Many Years Is Taken by Death Monday; Funeral Service**

Last Sept. 16 was the golden anniversary of their happy wedding, marked by all those graces which constitute a real happy home.

She was a member of the Baptist church and a constant attendant when able, also a charter member of the W. C. T. U. and member of the H. P. Woman's club. She was an omnivorous reader of good literature. She and her family came to Highland Park in 1888 and 16 years ago erected their home on 532 Onwentsia avenue in which her passing took place.

For ten long years she had been a patient sufferer.
