FUNERAL OF E. COOK HELD LAST MONDAY

Brother Located in Canada But Unable to Come; Insurance Is Considerable

The body of Ernest Cook, who died some time ago from injuries previously sustained when an iron form fell on him from one of the Borchardt towers on North St. Johns avenue, was buried Monday in the Mooney cemetery. The man had no relatives here, but through the effort of the police and the Canadian consul in Chicago a brother was located in St. Johns, N. B. The brother was notified that it would be well worth his while to come and identify the body, but he wrote that it was impossible for him to come. As it is reported that about \$3,500 workman's compensation insurance is collectable by the heirs, it is probable that later they may attempt to claim the money. Cook had discharge papers from the Canadian army, and shortly after his burial a message was received by the police from a veteran's post in Winnipeg, inquiring about the case, report of which had been carried by press associations to Canadian newspapers.

ATTEMPT TO STEAL CAR IS FRUSTRATED

Several Autos Found Abandoned Here and Returned to the Owners Recently

It was turned over to the North Shore Buick Co., on order from the owner.

LAKE CO. IS SECOND IN MARRIAGE RECORD

Cook Only Has Greater Number in Past Year; Thirteenth in Divorces

Lake county stands second to Cook in marriages, and drops to 13th rank in divorces granted, according to the 1924 report just issued by the department of commerce.

In Cook county 39,943 marriage licenses were issued in 1924 and 41,821 in 1923. In Lake 4,014 licenses were written out in 1924 and 4,021 in 1923. There is a slight drop in both instances between 1924 and 1923, but this situation is found all over the state.

For Illinois the record on marriage is:

In 1924—81,918.
 In 1923—84,068, or a decrease of 2.6 per cent in 1924.

Divorces increased, with this record.

In 1924—13,657.
 In 1923—12,317, or an increase of 10.9 per cent.

In divorces 110 were granted in Lake county in 1924 and 117 in 1923.

The high school Girl Reserve club of "Live Yers" have adopted the plan to keep several Indian girls. Each two girls are going to select one Indian girl whom they shall write to and at Thanksgiving send a basket of "goodies." Also at Christmas time each two girls will take it upon themselves to send her things which they think she will enjoy, such as scraps of material with which they can make interesting little things. Indian girls have a deal of time and they enjoy sewing.

The "Live Yers" are very much interested in doing for the Indians, because previously they have done for China and many far away countries but the Indian friends are in our own United States and are a very fascinating race.

The girls also find much pleasure in studying Indian life and customs, the customs, many of which are now in existence, by the tribes that have not disappeared.

Miss Redwine told the girls last Monday about an Indian girl with whom she went to school. Her name is Miss Ruth Muskrat and she is now at Mt. Holyoke. At one time she was selected to represent her people and the President being very impressed by her, invited her to the White house.

Through the coming year the girls are going to give Indian programs and continue with the study of the Indians.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

Three paintings, all by Chicago artists, have recently been loaned to the Public Library by one who has taken a kindly interest in the institution. The pictures are "In a Garden" by Karl A. Buehr, "Wild Blossoms" by Alfred Jansson, and "Old Church at Provincetown" by Pauline Palmer. These pictures are hanging in the children's room, where the children, looking up at them from their books, cannot fail to receive from them the inspiration which a beautiful picture inevitably gives.

Children's book week has come and gone, and has left in its wake a well-defined line of small foot-prints leading to the new children's room at the library, and a desire on the part of every child, unconscious to themselves, perhaps, to read better books and more of them. It is during these cold fall days, after school, that boys go adventuring with "Robinson Crusoe" and "Moby Dick" and play with "Tom Brown," and the girls take to "Little Women" and "Maid of 76." That the children are reading more and better books is shown conclusively by the titles on the list of over one thousand books issued to children during the month of October at the Public Library.

During children's book week a number of teachers brought their classes, within school hours, to visit the library, where the children were shown the use of the card catalogue, the outstanding reference books, the intricacies of book classification, and the tremendous possibilities of self-education in any library.

Of particular interest, both to children and adults, has been the display of beetles peculiar to the locality of the North Shore, loaned to the library by Mrs. Paul Wright of Highland Park. This display was collected, classified, and arranged by Mrs. Wright, and she has annotated it with interesting bits of information.

The book circulation at the library has shown a marked increase during the fall—an increase of a thousand books over a year ago. During the month of October 104 new borrowers were registered, making a total registration of 3,262 borrowers.
