GLENCOE NOW HAS AIRCRAFT ORDINANCE

TO REGULATE AIR TRAFFIC
Prohibits Trick Flying and Fixes Height Plane Must Keep Over Village; Other Provisions

Glencoe has a new aircraft ordinance, which was passed last week by the Village board and went into effect immediately upon passage. The new ordinance regulates all air traffic over the village and is to be in effect until such time as the state or federal government shall enact laws regulating air traffic.

The ordinance applies to "airplanes, hydroplanes, seaplanes, dirigible balloons, or other apparatus carrying one or more persons through the air, propelled by currents or by power or motors contained in said apparatus." It prohibits "trick" or "stunt" flying or any aerial acrobatics or manipulation which would divert the aircraft from its normal flight and which might jeopardize its stability. The ordinance also provides that a height of not less than 2,000 feet must be maintained while over the village, except at the beginning or end of a flight.

Persons riding in aircraft are prohibited from throwing or dropping ballast, instruments, tools, containers, handbills, etc., and all equipment must be adequately fastened in place. It is also provided that it is unlawful to land at any emergency landing place when the aircraft is under full control. Likewise, the right-of-way rule must be preserved in the air, and lighter-than-air craft have the right-of-way over heavier-than-air craft. The ordinance provides penalties of from \$20 to \$200 for each and every offense. It is somewhat similar to the Chicago aircraft ordinance, from which numerous suburbs have modeled ordinances recently. Winnetka also has a similar measure.
