DEERFIELD-SHIELDS IS LEAGUE CHAMPION

Defeat of Oak Park by Proviso Leaves Local Grid Team Title Holder

Proviso won from Oak Park 13 to 6 last Saturday at Maywood in the final league tilt of the season. As a result Deerfield is now the undisputed champion of the league with five victories and no defeats. Had Oak Park won, there would have been a tie for first place.

In 1921 the famous championship team under Captain "Red" Procter won the title with a 14 to 0 victory over Oak Park. Since then they have always placed high but this is the first season since 1921 that the team has come through with a clean record. Evanston, Thornton, Oak Park and Proviso are tied for second place.

On Thanksgiving day Deerfield-Shields football team will make a trip to Evanston where they will play the powerful Evanston aggregation. This promises to be one of the most popular games for the day as it is to be between the champion of the league and one of the largest schools in the circuit. Evanston will attempt to square themselves with the public by beating the league champions.

Evanston showed real class when they walked over New Trier last Saturday 20 to 0. Holland, Evanston's right half-back ran 40 yards from scrimmage for the first touchdown, while Heuser went ten yards off tackle for the last marker.

Waukegan sprang the biggest upset in the Suburban league football circuit when they beat the powerful Morton eleven last Saturday 13 to 7. Morton had previously held Oak Park to a 0 to 0 tie, and was expected to win from Waukegan by a large score. The game was played at Cicero.

Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Nearby Territory—County Seat

A coroner's jury exonerated Harold Thatcher of Libertyville of blame for the death of Martin Carney, 43, employe at the Meyer Construction camp near Libertyville, who died from injuries last week after being accidentally struck by Thatcher's car.

The marriage of Eula S. Clark of East St. Louis to William J. Smith, editor of the Waukegan Daily Sun and the Lake County Independent (Weekly) took place last week at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel S. Spivey, 1617 North 42nd street, East St. Louis.

"There has been more progress made both in the physical conditions and in the character of instruction in the Lake county schools than any other of the 101 counties in the state." That is the brief manner in which U. J. Hoffman, of Springfield, assistant superintendent of public instruction and supervisor of rural schools summed up his impressions of Lake county schools after making an inspection.
