### CAMPUS CAN MAKE OR BREAK STUDENT

HE MUST ADJUST HIMSELF

Right Word at Right Time Will Work Wonders; Value of Small College in Personal Touch Noted

The university campus can make or break the average student in these hectic days of high classroom standards and of varied extra-curriculum activities, and only the man who can adjust himself properly to his new environment can hope to reap any benefit from his four-years' experience. In talking recently over the radio, Prof. John J. B. Morgan, of the psychology department of Northwestern university, pictured the college misfit and laid down the axiom that sympathetic counsel on the part of a university personnel department can work wonders in adjusting the new student to his campus world. Prof. Morgan cited instances of college misfits turning out disastrously after quitting the campus and urged university authorities to exercise as far as possible personal contacts with the struggling new-comer.

Right Word at Right Time  
"A word of the right sort will do wonders," said Prof. Morgan. "A college student is likely to have a number of crises. The best learner is the one who changes his attitude toward different problems in line with the instruction he receives, but he cannot change all at once, nor should he change too easily. He must weigh things, accept some and reject others. In other words, education is an upsetting process and we have learned that while most students gain their equilibrium after each tilt, that some require a little aid in keeping properly balanced."

Personal Contact Valuable  
"By what sort of machinery can such a program be carried out? In a small institution where classes are not large the personal contact of teacher and student enables the individual teacher to keep all his students from serious blunders. In large institutions this is impossible; it is there accomplished by a personnel organization. This organization keeps track of all the students before they enter college till long after they leave. The personnel department, however, does not seek to interfere in any of the student's activities but to tide him over hard places and see that he gets the most from college life. The student is interviewed personally by the personnel staff several

times during his college career. He is invited to express himself freely about any phase of college life, to tell his difficulties as well as his achievements. Oftentimes a short interview can work wonders; sometimes a lot is needed.

"Every mental or other crisis in a student's life means a period of radical changes. Will the change be for his good or will it be detrimental? Will the crisis take him up or drag him down? It is the university's aim to see that every crisis leaves the student better than if he had never passed through it. What we aim to do is to look for the crisis and then boost."

### UNIVERSITY HEADS TO MEET NEXT YEAR

Annual Meeting of Best Known Educators to Be Held at Northwestern

The presidents and deans of the graduate schools of twenty-six of the leading American universities, comprising some of the best known educators of the nation, will meet at Northwestern university next year at the annual gathering of the Association of American Universities. Dr. Walter Dill Scott, president of Northwestern university, who has just returned from this year's meeting at Yale university, brought word that the association had voted to meet at Northwestern a year hence. The membership of the Association of American Universities consists of the following: University of California, Catholic University of America, University of Chicago, Clark university, Columbia university, Cornell university, Indiana university, Harvard university, University of Illinois, State University of Iowa, John Hopkins university, U of Kansas, U of Michigan, U of Minnesota, U of Missouri, U of Nebraska, U of North Carolina, Northwestern university, Ohio State university, U of Pennsylvania, Princeton university, Stanford university, U of Virginia, Washington university, U of Wisconsin and Yale university.

"Northwestern university will play host to the eminent educators who will come here on that occasion," explained Dr. Scott. "A program will be arranged by the association and there will be one or two banquets and possibly other entertainments for the guests."

The men were named Paul Gashim and Julius Bazanof and were about 45 years of age each. One was a widower with three children in the old country and the other's wife and family also are in Russia.
