HIGHWOOD DEFEATS REBELS ON SUNDAY

Win in Last Quarter When Visitors Had Good Lead; Play Lake Forest Nov. 26

Highwood snapped into it and turned almost certain defeat to victory, in the last few minutes of play at Highwood field Sunday, when they defeated the Rebels 14-13.

The score was 13-8, Rebel A. C. of Austin on the big end, in the last part of the fourth quarter. Highwood was in their own territory, Stewart, ex-Deerfield star, tore around the left end and reversed his field for a run of 60 yards. He was stopped on the Rebel 14-yard line, Les Allen tore through tackle for 13 yards and Norman Fink dove through center for the winning touchdown.

The absence of Coach Bolan was very much in evidence, Highwood played throughout with the lack of teamwork and leadership that nearly cost them the game. Substitutions were frequent and injuries were more numerous than any other game this year. The injuries of Les Allen, Norman Fink and Ellwood may discount Highwood's chances of beating Lake Forest on Thanksgiving day.

Highwood has gone this far through the mid-west grid season without a defeat. In fact only two teams have scored on them. There is now only one game between the locals and championship of the middle division of the league. The Highwood boys are confident of putting their town on the map by bringing home the cup.

PLAYGROUND AT HIGH SCHOOL IS IMPROVED

Tract North of Auditorium Is Being Prepared for Use in Sports Line

All of the tile has been laid and the proper sewer connections made for the drainage of the new playground north of the Deerfield-Shields high school auditorium.

There are eleven lines of four inch tile, six of which are 140 feet long, draining the east half of the field, and five 110 feet long, draining the west, both emptying into a transverse north and south eight inch collecting main which runs to a manhole just outside the playground.

Because of the need of having games in which a great number can participate, present plans call for the construction of a number of volley ball, playground ball, handball, and tennis courts. There will also be an opportunity for the playing of horse-shoes and possibly other games. No definite plans have been drawn for the number or location of the courts, but the handball courts will undoubtedly be located in a position such that the north wall of the auditorium may be utilized.

Tennis, a game in which only a few can participate at one time, will probably be allowed only after school, the courts being used during the lunch hours for volley ball and other sports.
