tion was called into existence in the year 1875 when swenty-three families united in faith, loyalty and devotion to evangelical principles and to God, organized into a Christian organization. To supply the need of a place of worship these families decided to erect a house of God. The ground to build on having been previously donated by one of the charter members, Mr. Wm. Osterman. In November, 1875, the church was completed for dedication. Just previous to the dedication the Rev. Joseph Allard had been called to the pastorate of the church. It was a day of great rejoicing and a great achievement those pioneer days to be able to dedicate a house of God.
