50TH ANNIVERSARY DEERFIELD CHURCH

The service was beautified by the singing of two anthems by the choir of the St. Peter's Evangelical church and a song sung by the beginners and primary children of the local Sunday school.

The afternoon service proved to be a very impressive and inspiring service. Where, in the morning services the auditorium was comfortably filled with worshippers, for the afternoon service extra chairs had to be placed. The vested choir of the Evangelical church of Evanston under the able direction of Mr. Gerlitz and the organist, Mrs. Warner, opened the service singing the processional. Rev. Paul H. Vieth again spoke, taking for his subject the fourfold life of the child based on the physical, social, intellectual and religious life of Jesus, and the responsibility of the home, school, church and Sunday school in building up this fourfold life of the child.

Other Features
Rev. Williams of the Evangelical Bungalow church of Deerfield spoke very briefly and brought congratulations from his church. The choir sang two anthems and closed the service singing the recessional. The evening brought the crowning service of the day. Long before the opening of the service people came to guarantee for themselves a seat. As the time for the opening of the service approached every available seating space in the auditorium, in the balcony, on the platform and in the vestibule and aisle was occupied.

Rev. R. Stanger of the Grace Evangelical church, Chicago, addressed the congregation on the need of the church in the present day. Rev. Mark Andrews of the First Presbyterian church of Deerfield, spoke briefly on the need of denominational co-operation.

The special music of the evening was furnished by Miss Barbara Huehl, soprano; Mr. Ewald Winter, tenor and Mr. George Beckman, violinist, accompanied by Mrs. Getty of Deerfield and Mrs. Sprague of Chicago. That this special music added much to the beauty and success of the service needs no comment.

Extends Thanks
The pastor of the church wishes to thank all who participated in the programs and services of the day and thus helped make the day a success. The way in which the members of the Deerfield and neighboring churches and the friends responded to the invitations extended by the St. Paul's Evangelical church is commendable.

St. Paul's Evangelical congregation was called into existence in the year 1875 when twenty-three families united in faith, loyalty and devotion to evangelical principles and to God, organized into a Christian organization. To supply the need of a place of worship these families decided to erect a house of God. The ground to build on having been previously donated by one of the charter members, Mr. Wm. Osterman. In November, 1875, the church was completed for dedication. Just previous to the dedication the Rev. Joseph Allard had been called to the pastorate of the church. It was a day of great rejoicing and a great achievement in those pioneer days to be able to dedicate a house of God.

It was during Rev. Jungh's time that a parsonage and schoolhouse were built. The parsonage is still serving its purpose and the schoolhouse is being used by the Sunday school.

Other Organizations
A Ladies Aid was also organized, an organization which was active in the church from the first, increasing its activities with its years of existence.

The present pipe-organ was installed during the pastorate of Rev. F. Bosold. Many of the improvements such as sidewalks, new lights, new floors and painting of buildings resulted.

During Rev. Holdgraf's service the church underwent a complete remodeling. Such a change has come over the building that internally the old is hardly recognizable.

The present membership of the congregation numbers seventy-five with fifty additional contributing members. Only one of the charter members is living today, Mrs. David Horenberger. The Sunday school enrollment is seventy-five. In the course of the fifty years sixty-five were baptized, three hundred and fifty-eight confirmed, one hundred and eleven couples married and one hundred and seventy-eight buried.

The St. Paul's Evangelical church is at present a member of the Evangelical Synod of North America and as such stands for the principles which this church advocates. A statement of these principles will appear in next week's issue. This report is furnished by the pastor, F. G. Piepenbrok.
