HUBBARD WOODS PLANS COMMUNITY ICE RINK

MAY FLOOD STATION PARK

Park Board Appropriates Fund and Additional Money Pledged for Project; Full-Time Attendant Also

Outlook is promising for a community skating rink planned at Hubbard Woods this winter. The station park will be flooded, if present plans carry, as soon as winter really sets in and it is cold enough to freeze good skating ice.

The Winnetka park board has set aside \$500 for the purpose of preparing the ground for flooding, the village will donate the needed water, the local carpenters, under the leadership of C. R. Serimgeour, are planning to donate a shelter-house and the business men of the district are going to provide the necessary material for it.

Money is Pledged Money already has been pledged for the project and the newly formed Hubbard Woods Skating club, which is backing the proposed rink, are busily selling club memberships at \$10 to \$100 for subscription memberships, \$5 for regular season family memberships and \$2 for junior memberships.

Skaters on the station park rink will have the advantage of seeing where they skate even in the evening, for the rink will be lighted by the ornamental lighting system which was recently installed around the border of the park.

Full-Time Attendant A full-time attendant will be stationed at the rink to keep the ice in the best condition possible and to keep order among the crowds of skaters who are sure to keep the place thronged most of the time.

INDIAN TRAIL TREE DEDICATION IS HELD

Ancient Marker Recently Moved In Evanston Center of Interest

The Pottawatomie trail tree, which was a trail marker of the Pottawatomie Indians, residents of this section for upward of 200 years, recently moved from west of the Calvary station to Lake Front park, Davis street and Forest avenue, Evanston, was dedicated Saturday afternoon at a special service, under the auspices of the Fort Dearborn chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mrs. Wilbur Helm, regent of the Fort Dearborn chapter, had charge of the dedicatory service and members of the chapter were present and gave the daughters' salute to the flag. J. Seymour Currey, an authority on the early history of Evanston, gave a short talk and Dean James Alton James of the faculty of Northwestern university told something of our Indian predecessors.

Mrs. G. J. Reelman was instrumental in having the tree removed to its present position when she found that this ancient relic was in danger of being killed because building operations close by were undermining it. She called the matter to the attention of Mayor Charles H. Bartlett, who saw that the tree was preserved.

REALTY BOARD FAVORS NEW TAX AMENDMENT

North Shore Society at Monthly Dinner Vote to Support Measure

Members of the North Shore Real Estate board met at the Lake Shore tavern on Sheridan road, Wilmette, last week, at their regular monthly dinner and business session, at which they were treated to a splendid talk by Mayor Max Murdock, legal expert and executive secretary of the Illinois Association of Real Estate boards, on the subject of the proposed tax amendment to the constitution of the state of Illinois, which will be submitted to the voters at the general election November 3, 1926.

The purpose of this measure is to permit the General Assembly to employ methods of taxation other than those now provided by the constitution, which forces real estate at present to pay 85 per cent of the taxes, while constituting only 37.4 per cent of the wealth of the state. Naturally, the board voted to take an active part in educating the property owners of the entire north shore on this subject so vital to all.

McGregor Adams, recently enlarged and improved, and a beach house where the camp sewing is done and where the mothers make over clothing that has been donated to the camp for the use of the children, which was built a short time ago.

Cinderella lodge, for the accommodation of little girls who are attending the camp without their mothers, is another one of the Arden Shore buildings. It was the gift of the new president of the association, Mrs. Tuttle, in memory of her mother, Mrs. James L. Houghteling.

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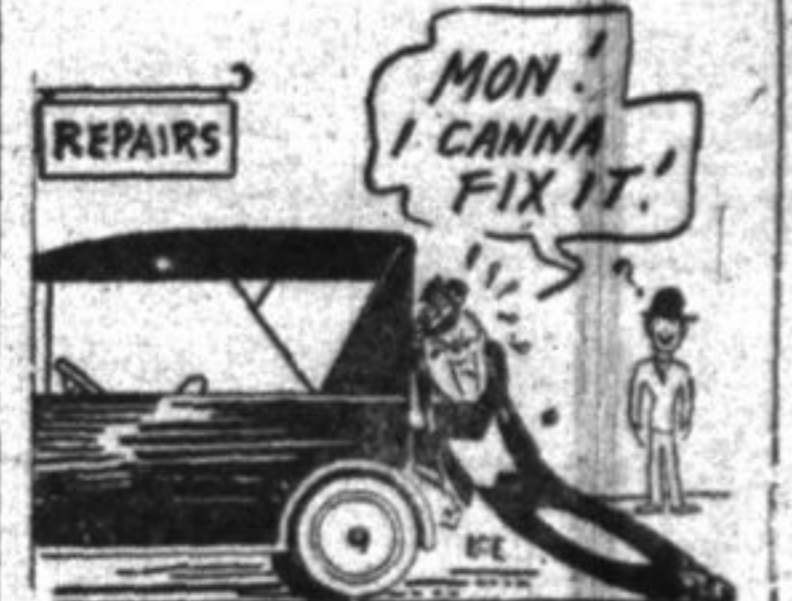
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
