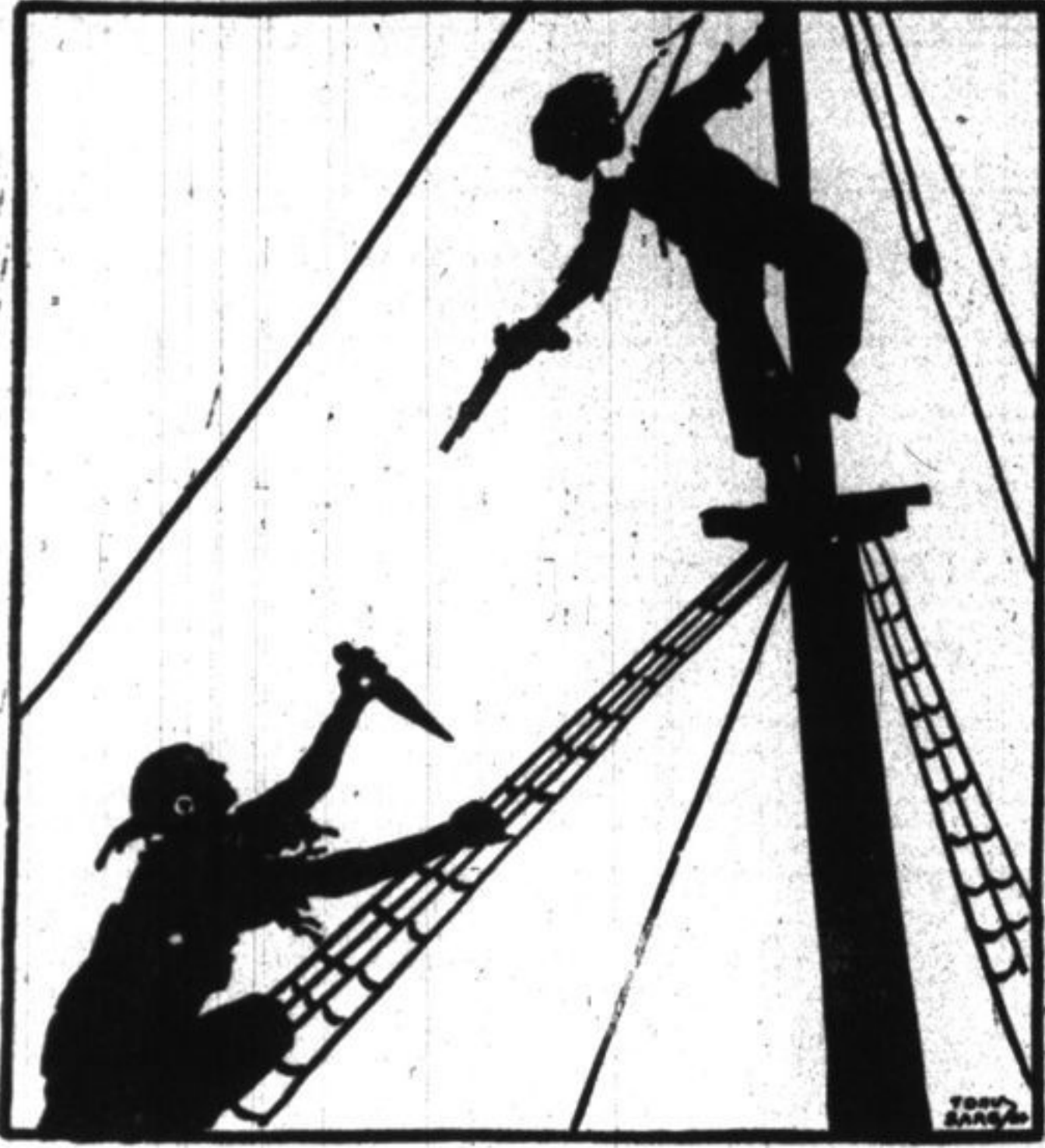

NO THIRD TERM
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FAITH AND DISEASE
HIS GODS IN VAIN

James Hamilton Lewis, always picturesque, but sometimes inaccurate, says the Republican nomination fight in 1928 will be between Secretary Hoover and Vice-President Dawes. He says that the "two term tradition established by Washington will not break down."

Mr. Lewis is just 100 per cent wrong in two ways. There isn't any question of a two term tradition.

Mr. Coolidge has been elected by the people ONCE, and it is the election, not the accident of a Presidential death, that counts. Unless we have very bad times in America, between now and 1928, and we shall NOT have them, the nomination and election of President Coolidge are as certain as anything can be.

It will be literally possible through moving pictures to teach a child in three-quarters of an hour, and to teach well, thoroughly and PERMANENTLY, more than the child can learn under proper methods in a dozen days of eight hours, spent indoors at a time when the child ought to be out in the sunshine.

CABINET MEMBERS NOT BUNK SHOOTERS

Prefer to Let Deeds Speak for Them; People of Country Like System

The alleged oratorical weakness of the Coolidge cabinet is being discussed with some satisfaction by the Democrats. It is true that the President does not possess in his official family such vocalists as Heflin of Alabama, the vitriolic Reed of Missouri, or other noise-producing experts.

Secretary Mellon, who has most skillfully guarded the finances of the people, is decidedly different when it comes to making a speech. Attorney General Sargent prefers to whittle rather than to gallivant around the country exuding vast and copious quantities of language. Herbert Hoover speaks only when the occasion demands. Business achievements rather than oratory count with him. Secretary Kellogg makes but few public speeches. Senator William M. Butler of Massachusetts, who is the chairman of the Republican National committee and one of President Coolidge's advisers, works on the theory that silence is golden, and he accomplishes much.

The people of the country like this system. They believe in deeds rather than words. The Coolidge administration has no need for a vociferous "bally-ho."

LAWS AND THE PUBLIC

Every year sees the addition of thousands of new laws to the statute books. It is useless to pretend that many of these laws are not utterly farcical and incapable of enforcement. There are some laws that single themselves out in the public

PRESENT YEAR IS IMPORTANT FOR GAS

Probably Biggest in History of This Manufactured Product, Say Experts

"The year 1925 will probably be the most important year that the manufactured gas industry has ever had," Griffin Gribel, president of the Eastern States gas conference, declared recently during the convention at Atlantic City of the American Gas association.

"The American gas industry has entered the foreground as the producer of an ideal and eventually universal fuel. It is claiming the entire heating field for its own."

"It is being predicted that virtually all heating processes in industry will sooner or later be fired by gaseous fuel supplied by central stations. Also, that most of the country's homes will have to turn to gas for heating, assisted for a time perhaps, by other smokeless fuels such as oil, which is generally considered an entering wedge for gas."

"As a first step toward this end the American Gas association has established a laboratory in Cleveland for testing all kinds of gas-burning appliances."

Also there is a popular impression that Christmas packages should not be mailed so they will reach their recipients before January 1.

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
