**Enviab Record**

The North Shore Line is making an enviable record in its first aid work. For several years an organized effort has been made to train all employes how to meet emergencies calling for first aid treatment. This training includes cases of drowning, heat prostration, suffocation, asphyxiation, electrical shock and other possible accidents.

Many lives have been saved through practical application of this training by North Shore Line employes. In the majority of cases the aid has been given to persons not employed by the company and in accidents occurring when the employes were not on duty.

That the first aid work of the North Shore Line organization has been successful is attested by public recognition. Most notable was the recent election of the North Shore Line girls' first aid drill team, graduated previous to the present one, to appear in demonstrations before the annual convention of the Illinois Association of Graduate Nurses at Springfield.

#### NEAR EAST WOMEN KEEPING HAIR LONG

Still Regard It as Crowning Glory; Peculiar Malady Attacks It

"Blessed are the shingled" may be the feeling in the United States, but in Bible Lands a woman's hair is still her crowning glory. According to a Near East Relief report, "the care of the hair has been more of a problem here than anywhere else in the world," because the women have suffered so much as a result of famine and malnutrition. A disease known as favus, which strikes at the roots of the hair, is peculiarly prevalent in the refugee districts, and has received special attention from the American doctors because it is found almost universally among the refugee orphans who are their special care.

The Americans, after long study, have discovered that this disease can be combated by means of the X-ray, which is now widely used for this purpose.

Children in the American orphanages are required to wear bobbed hair until they are eight years old. Great is the delight of the girl orphans when they reach that age and are permitted to let their hair grow. They revel in long tresses and woe unto the girl who is exceptionally naughty, because that means she will have to wear her hair bobbed, the direct punishment that can be inflicted.

#### SEVEN SAFETY RULES FOR AUTO DRIVERS

Seven safety rules are being urged by all of the automobile inspectors working under the direction of Secretary of State, Louis L. Emmerson. They are:

1. Inspect brakes at least once a month.
2. Slow down at street intersections. Do not pass to the left of a street car.
3. Do not pass a street car that is stopping for passengers except at points where a traffic officer is stationed and motions you to pass.
4. Always signal with the hand when about to turn, slow down or stop.
5. Sound horn three times when backing.
6. When crossing a sidewalk at an alley or driveway, go very slowly.

#### YOUNG ONLY ONCE; TRY TO KEEP SO

"We are only young once," you often hear some person remark as an excuse for "hitting the pace." True, we can be young but once, and the pleasure of youth must be crowded into that space of time.

### SAYS U. S. SHOULD KEEP OUT OF EUROPE

#### Congressman Returns From Trip Abroad and Warns of Any Entanglement

Congressman George H. Tinkham, of Boston, has recently returned from Europe, where he spent considerable time studying the workings of the league of nations and the league court. Mr. Tinkham says he is now convinced that the United States should keep out of the league and the league court unless it is to be clearly understood that we want to abandon our time-honored foreign policy of non-interference in European affairs.

In a statement Mr. Tinkham said: "The United States should not enter either the council or assembly at Geneva or the league court at The Hague unless it is clearly understood that in joining either of these mechanisms the United States is definitely entering upon a covenant with the league of nations and abandoning forever a clear-cut, consistent foreign policy of no foreign political alliances directly or indirectly.

"The council and assembly are a political mechanism and the league court is an essential organ of the council and assembly and has its being and character from them, although by a separate statute to which all the members of the council and assembly have adhered.

"The court is chosen by the council and assembly, paid by them, pensioned by them, and reports to them, and must be re-elected every nine years by them, and so is under their dominion and political control.

"This is not an independent free court such as the United States should join, unless it desires to be entangled finally in European politics."

#### DENOUNCES GROWTH OF PATERNALISM

#### Governor of Maryland Declares Too Much Federal Interference Is Bad

The practice of granting federal subsidies to states and the absorption of functions of the states by the federal government were denounced in a recent address by Governor Albert F. Ritchie, of Maryland, who declared that the subsidies alone during the past fiscal year amounted to more than ninety-four millions of dollars. Governor Ritchie said:

"It has already given the federal government supervision over state roads, state agriculture, motherhood and infant hygiene and vocational education and rehabilitation. Its advocates are aiming at the schools now, and are asking \$100,000,000 a year from the federal government for that. Its whole tendency is to destroy the principle of local self-government, and so the system is indefensible as a governmental policy in this country.

"It is one of the most prolific feeders of waste and incompetence in the country today, because it is directly responsible for a large part of the bureaucratic government which has gripped Washington and which has caused the personnel of federal bureaus to grow 25 per cent since 1914, the year the system began, and five times faster than the population of the country."

#### STARTING AMERICAN COLLEGE IN GREECE

#### Good Beginning Made and the Project Is Much Favored By Its People

The beginning of an American university in Athens, a project dear to the Greek heart, is marked by the opening of the first unit of such a university, a preparatory school to be known as the American School of Athens. The purpose of the school, as specified in its governmental charter, is "to provide western training for Greek youths." Eventually it is hoped that funds will be provided for the addition of college courses, as well as for schools of scientific studies, law, pedagogy and other branches. The Greek government has provided land on a generous scale, and the school will have exceptional treatment in exemptions from taxation and similar governmental favor.

The school is under the direction of a Greek-American committee, of which the American members are H. C. Jaquith, director of the Near East Relief, and Prof. Bert H. Hill, head of the School of Classical Studies there.
