

MUSIC MEMORY TEST PLAN IS DIFFERENT

New System for High School Contests Adopted This Year, Report Says

Types of music is the main theme which high school students will study for the music memory contest to be held at Orchestra hall this year under the supervision of the "In and About Chicago Music Supervisor club." The students will study nationality of music and the sonata form used by the classic, romantic, and modern schools. There will be very little memory work.

This scheme for the contest is radically different than in previous years in which the work was based on memory only. This year the orchestra, the Chicago Symphony, will play unfamiliar pieces; these will be identified by the students according to nationality, movement, school, or composer.

Virginia Onderdonk, who was graduated from Deerfield-Shields in 1925, has been selected by President Pendleton as the chairman of the freshman class at Wellesley, which is one of the best known girls colleges in the east. Virginia was the only one of her class to enter Wellesley. The only other Deerfield graduate at Wellesley is Frances Acomb of the class of 1924. Regarding this honor to a former student the Shore Line, the high school paper, says:

While at Deerfield Virginia was one of the most prominent members of her class. On the senior class ballot she received first place as most successful girl and second place as most studious girl. In athletics she played class hockey in her sophomore, junior, and senior years and class basketball in her junior year. She was also a member of the D. G. A. in her last year.

She was a member of the Latin club in her second and third years, the French club in her last three years and the Blue and White club in her third. She belonged to both the Junior and Senior Garrick clubs and was a member of the cast of "The Boomerang," the 1925 senior play.

Had Great Interest in Music Virginia had a great interest in music and was on the Music Memory team for three years. In spite of all these and a few other activities she never neglected her studies. She was on the Honor Roll every year and many times received 4A's.

Perhaps her greatest honor was her selection as Editor-in-chief of the 1925 Annual. After a great deal of work the Annual board produced one of the best Annuals Deerfield has ever had.

HIGH SCHOOL PLAN FESTIVAL OF MUSIC

To Be Held at Highland Park and Oak Park in May; Schools to Participate

Principal Sandwick and Mr. Dinkeloo of Deerfield-Shields high school met representatives from various schools in the Chicago district at the Central Y. M. C. A. last week, to plan and discuss a high school music festival to be given early in May.

The festival is being planned to bring out the best music of the school for the music lovers of the community and to bring closer together the neighboring high schools.

It is probable that the festival will be given in two places, Oak Park and Highland Park, because of the fine auditoriums available at both places. If the festival is held in two towns, as is now planned, all the performers will appear in one town in the afternoon and evening, while on the following day they will perform, afternoon and evening, in the other town. There will be no admission fee in the afternoon; in the evening a reasonable price will be charged.

Among the schools which were represented and which signified their intention of taking part were: J. Sterling Morton, with a large violin choir; Oak Park with its orchestra; Thornton with its band; Elmhurst with its Girls' Glee club which sings part songs which have as many as seven parts; Evanston, La Grange, Proviso, New Trier, and Deerfield, who are undecided as to how they will be represented.

EVANSTON DEFEATS DEERFIELD-SHIELDS

At Evanston on Thanksgiving day the Evanston high school football team defeated the Deerfield-Shields eleven in a post-season game. The score was 34 to 7. Deerfield players had the advantage during the first half but were unable to hold their stride, and the Evanstonians came through strong in the last half. Captain Martin for Deerfield and Stayman for Evanston were the chief ground gainers for their respective teams. Attendance at the game is estimated at about 2,000, including many Deerfield students and their friends.

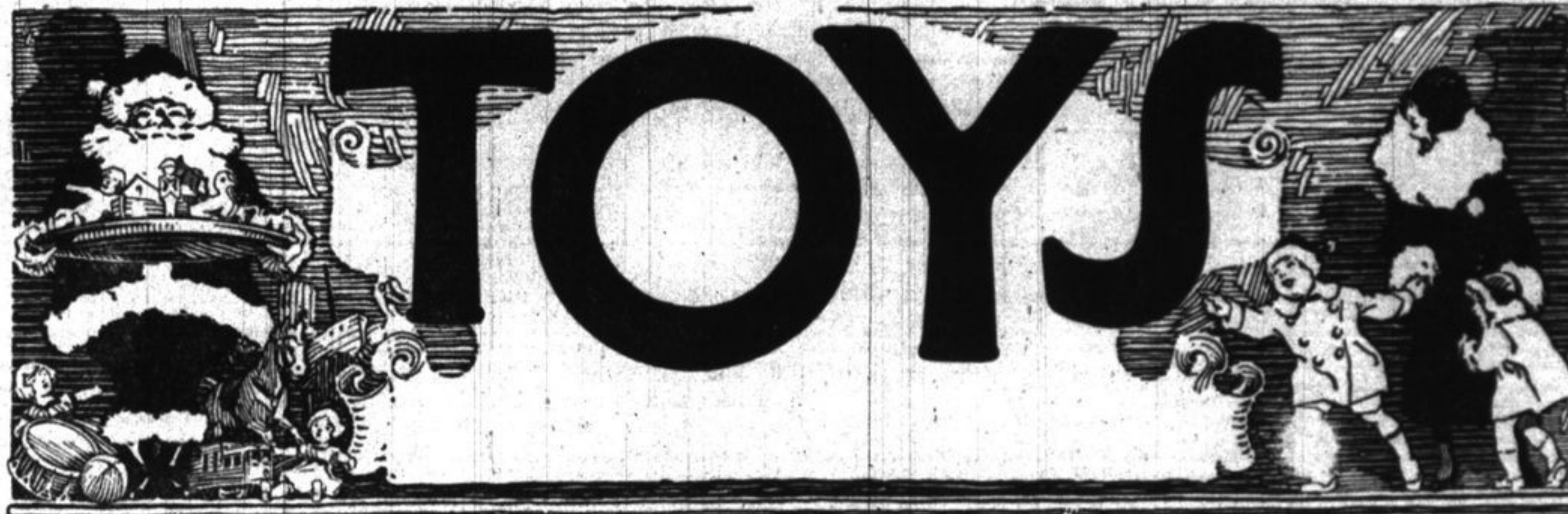
