

**BOYS-GIRLS CLUBS TO HOLD CONGRESS**

**In Own Building on Grounds of International Livestock Exposition**

The Fourth National Boys' and Girls' Club Congress will be held in its own building on the grounds of the International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago, November 27th to December 4th, with over twelve hundred champion club members and their leaders in attendance.

Representative state champion demonstration teams will give daily illustrated lectures on various club projects and teams of Indian youths will give special performances. There will be a style show in which one girl from each state will act as model in clothing she has made herself. The National Health Contest will be decided between the boys and girls who have been declared champions in

their home states. The Moses Leadership Trophy will be awarded to the boy or girl whose record shows the most outstanding leadership for the year in club work in the entire United States.

The juniors will enter their baby beeves in the live stock feeding contests and their club corn in a special junior class of the International Grain and Hay Show, both regular contests of the Exposition proper. For the first time, classes have been added this year for cotton and potato exhibits in the Club Congress, each state being allowed to make a single entry. There will also be an exhibit of canned goods, clothing, room improvement displays and posters with one entry from a state.

**An Appreciation**

Sunday and Monday of this week were set aside as days of special recognition for Dr. Peter C. Wolcott as he changed his official relation towards Trinity Episcopal church from that of rector to rector-emeritus. His faithful parishioners at various services and functions gave convincing evidence of their appreciation of his work amongst them, an appreciation in which Mrs. Wolcott had her share. It would seem appropriate that during the same week there should be an expression of the admiration and loyalty in which Dr. Wolcott is held by the large group of citizens who are not connected with his parish.

Such a public expression in the pages of our local newspaper is all the more fitting when we remember that for more than a generation Dr. Wolcott was not only rector of Trinity church, but an active citizen of Highland Park. He was never narrow nor exclusive in his sympathies. He served our whole community and not merely a part of our community. There is no one living in Highland Park today, not even excluding the most recently settled citizens, who is not profiting by his untiring zeal for the higher interests of our city. Dr. Wolcott's efforts are seen today in our high school buildings. Our library owes more to him than to anyone else. During the World war he was president of the Community Service board. Since he first came to us he has watched Highland Park quadruple in population, multiply its resources, increase its homes and establish itself as a leading Chicago suburb. During this period of growth and expansion the entire community has felt the touch of his guidance. Highland Park has many worthy citizens, but no other citizen in its history has given his service so freely, so patiently and for so long a time to its highest interests. Dr. Wolcott has been a beloved and respected figure in our midst for thirty-four years. He is known by every group. We have confidence in his judgments and we know that we can always trust his motives. That is a great record.

The outstanding gift which Dr. Wolcott has made to Highland Park is the spiritual quality of his personality. This was just as definite a power for those of us who seldom heard him preach as for those who were members of his own congregation. We have not needed his utterance to be convinced. To one watching him on the platform at some public ceremony, chatting with him in his home, seeing him walk down the street, conferring with him on some committee, the man himself was a proof of life's unseen values. He has been the rector of a local church, but there has been no partisan prejudice in his dealing with people. All alike could be sure of courtesy and kindness at his hands. One never thinks of his churchmanship or the fact that he wears the uniform of his office, for his main impression upon us is born of his mysticism, that high reach of the spirit which is infinitely greater than our common classifications and divisions. When a community can lay claim to one who carries this priceless gift of consecrated personality, can lay claim to him for thirty-four years, there is cause for gratitude. The effect of such a life, dealing with the invisible and intangible, refuses to be measured, but it is altogether too unmistakable not to be valued.

With this gift of spirit there has been given to us a gift of mind. If Dr. Wolcott had not been an untiring rector, giving much time to the details of tasks which made a difference to the rest of us, he might have been a scholar in the professional sense. As it is he carries with him the atmosphere of scholarship and as far as his activities allow he keeps himself informed of the findings of the scholars. There are always books in abundance about his home and if one calls upon him the chances are that he is reading. And yet he never limits himself to the writings that deal with his profession. He roams in many fields of knowledge and one has only to draw him out in conversation to find the surprising resources of his mind. With this intellectual discernment there is the blessing of a balanced outlook which enables him to see the weak points of all extremists. We know that his judgment is never wild.

Above all Dr. Wolcott stands before us as a Christian gentleman embodying a tradition which is at once a mixture of the old world and the new. He cannot be described as either old-fashioned or modern. The qualities that bring him before our minds—simple faith, charity, courtesy, unhurrying accomplishment—are timeless. As he lived amongst us he was far away from all suspicions and jealousies. It is difficult to think of him as having an enemy. Never once has he sought to magnify himself. The very thought of self-advertising would be repellent. As a young man he had studied the writings of John Henry Newman and in the intimacy of his study he once read to a friend Newman's description of a gentleman. The friend felt that unconsciously the reader was giving a description of himself.

His consecrated spirit, his intellectual balance, his fine courtesy—these gifts of his, freely bestowed for our benefit, we had through many years and we are glad to think that we have them still. Dr. Wolcott is no longer in full charge of Trinity church and he is leaving us for the winter months

but we expect to see him in Highland Park again. Our community still requires his presence for we appreciate what he has been, is now and can be to us all. In the meantime we offer him our congratulations as he lays down the burden of his official task and bid him Godspeed as he enters on a time of well-earned rest.

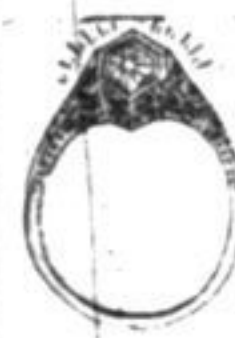

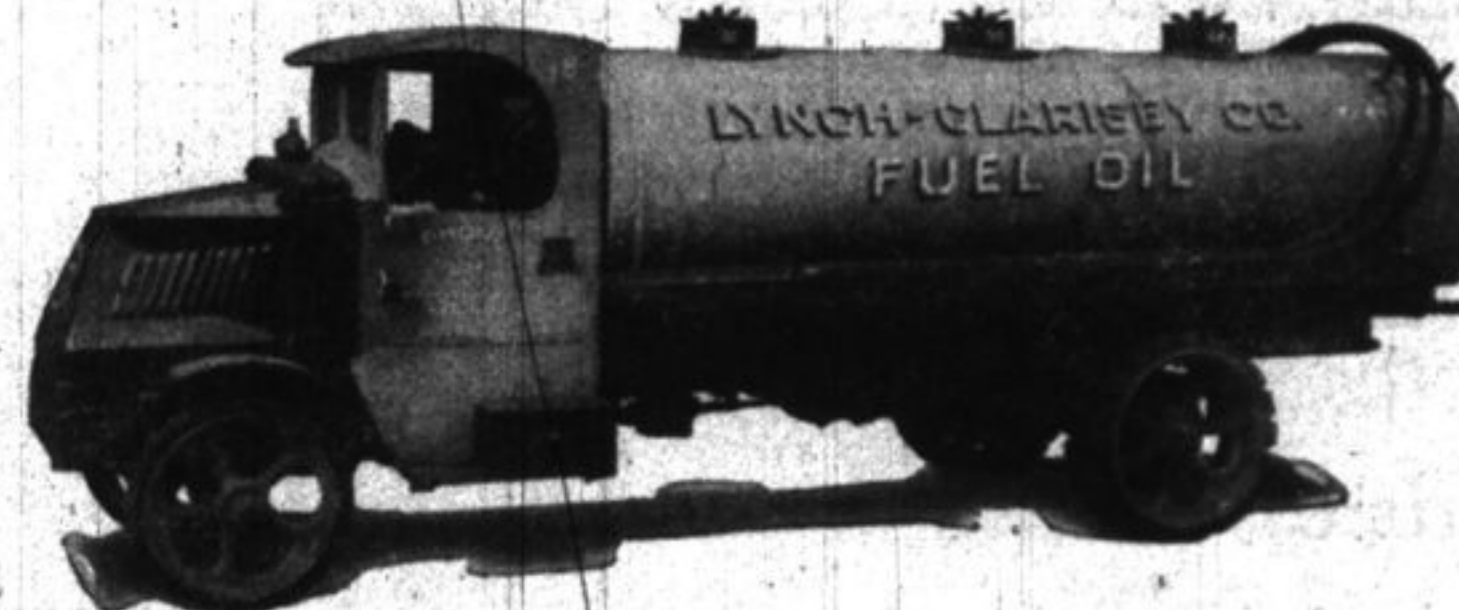

**Change in Method**

of Completing “Station-to-Station” Calls from Wheeling to Highland Park, both ways

In order to render quicker and more efficient service from Wheeling to Highland Park, both ways, a new method of handling “station-to-station” calls will be inaugurated effective December 1, 1925.

A “station-to-station” call is defined as a call to a telephone number where the calling party will talk to anyone who answers.

After the above mentioned date, in making “station-to-station” calls to Highland Park from Wheeling or Wheeling to Highland Park, please give the local operator the number desired, the same as you do in making a local call; for example, Wheeling 123 or Highland Park 1234, and remain with the receiver at your ear until the connection is established.

If you desire to talk with a particular person in Wheeling or Highland Park, to reverse the charges, or make a toll or long distance call to any other point, please continue to ask your local operator for “Long Distance” and place the call with that operator.
