MANY CORPORATIONS FAILING TO REPORT STATE SECRETARY REPORT

More Than Two Thousand Firms in Illinois Have Not Paid Franchise Taxes; Fewer Than Last Year

Secretary of State, Louis L. Emerson, today certified to the Attorney-General the names and locations of 2099 Illinois corporations that failed to file their annual reports and pay their annual franchise taxes.

The indications are, therefore, that 2099 corporations failed last year notwithstanding the fact the secretary of state's office fully advised all such corporations of the penalties following failure to file annual reports and pay franchise taxes.

Number Decreased
This is a decrease from the number failing in the previous year. Over 90 per cent of the apparent failures are located in Cook county.

Under the general corporation act each corporation must file an annual report in the office of the secretary of state in February of each year and pay an annual franchise tax by July 1. The act applies to all corporations other than banks, insurance companies, building and loan associations, religious concerns and corporations not organized for profit.

Under the same act the secretary of state is authorized to certify to the attorney-general for dissolution the names and locations of corporations failing to file reports and pay franchise taxes.

May Be Reinstated
Such corporations may be reinstated any time before being dissolved by the attorney-general, by paying to the secretary of state all franchise taxes and penalties due the state.

Upon receipt of the certifications from the secretary of state, the attorney-general endeavors to obtain service on the corporations through the sheriffs of counties in which they are located. Failing in this, publication is made in some newspaper in the home county of the corporation for three successive weeks. If the corporations fail to reply to the publication notice, the attorney-general goes into court and secures a decree of dissolution. This decree is certified to the secretary of state and the corporation is wiped off the books.

PRINCE OF WALES IS TO BE AN EXHIBITOR

Animal from His Canadian Ranch Is Entered In Chicago Fat Stock Show

Among the thousands of entries received by Secretary Manager B. H. Heide in the International Live Stock Exposition which will be held in Chicago, November 28th to December 5th, was that of H. R. H. The Prince of Wales, who will exhibit his famous bull "King of the Fairies" from his western Canadian ranch. Entries have been especially heavy in the cattle classes with the milking Short-horn breed showing the largest increase. Interest in the carload division has been much greater than ever before, insuring the largest display of market animals in the history of the show.

Farm boys and girls will exhibit over twenty-five per cent more baby beeves in the junior feeding contest than any former year and for the first time will hold a separate auction at which their entries will be sold at the close of the show. Exhibitors will be allowed to enter their light horses in the Horse Show up to November 16, and their live stock in the carload classes up to November 21, inclusive. When the final totals are recorded it is expected that the greatest array of purebred and market live stock ever assembled will be ready for the inspection of the army of visitors when the gates are opened on November 28.

Fifty-one leading authorities including two from Great Britain have been invited to serve as judges in the live stock classes alone.

H. P. CHILDREN AID MOOSEHEART PROGRAM

Illinois Day was celebrated at Mooseheart, the child city of the Loyal Order of Moose, on Sunday, November 22nd, when the Illinois Society of Mooseheart children was organized.

Three Highland Park children took part in the ceremonies, Bernice Frances Sack, 9 years old, Roland Joseph, 8 and Norman Francis, 4. Their father was Frank C. Sack, an electric switchboard wiper, who died on the train, on the way to Highland Park, of disease of the heart brought on by excessive heat on July 12th, 1921. He had joined the Loyal Order of Moose a short time prior to his death, and the members of the local lodge procured the admission of the little girl and two boys to Mooseheart on May 20th, 1922. There they will receive a high school education, be taught a trade or occupation that will make them self-supporting when they leave at the age of 18, and in addition have work on the large farm here which will make them familiar with such operations.

GIRLS WIN WORLD TRIP IN CONTEST

Given by Illinois Chamber of Commerce; Others Going to Panama Zone

Miss Geraldine Dyson, of Springfield and Miss Irene Mitchell of Chicago, winners of the two trips around the world given by the Illinois Chamber of Commerce and the Chicago Daily News, left for New York last week on the Baltimore & Ohio railroad. With them were five girls who won trips through the Panama Canal.

These five were Ethel Malone of Cairo; Kathryn Bevan of Joliet; Meta Lohrke, of Niles Center; Mary Murray, of Chicago and Helen Allee of Chicago. These five, runners-up in the ticket selling contest for the Illinois Products Exposition, held in October, travel with the two winners on a Dollar line steamer from New York to San Francisco via the Canal Zone and then take a train home.

Misses Dyson and Mitchell will

arrive home some time in March.

ANCIENT PUMPS ARE GONE; ELECTRIC NOW

Some of the most primitive pumps in the world have recently been supplanted by electrically driven water pumps. The "Near East Relief" maintains at Syria, an island just off the coast of Greece, an orphanage which cares for 2500 children brought from Turkey after the Smyrna disaster. Here the principal water supply came from deep wells. Earthen jars attached to wheels rotated by donkeys

brought the water to the surface. Now, however, electric motors drive the pumps and raise the water from these wells.

The electric improvements were installed by boys in the orphanage who, having special mechanical aptitude, were apprenticed to an electrical contractor. The actual work of installing the motor-driven pumps, which daily handle 120 tons of water, was done by the orphanage boys as part of their school work in manual training. Water is supplied for the orphanage gardens as well as for use in the dormitories and school buildings.
