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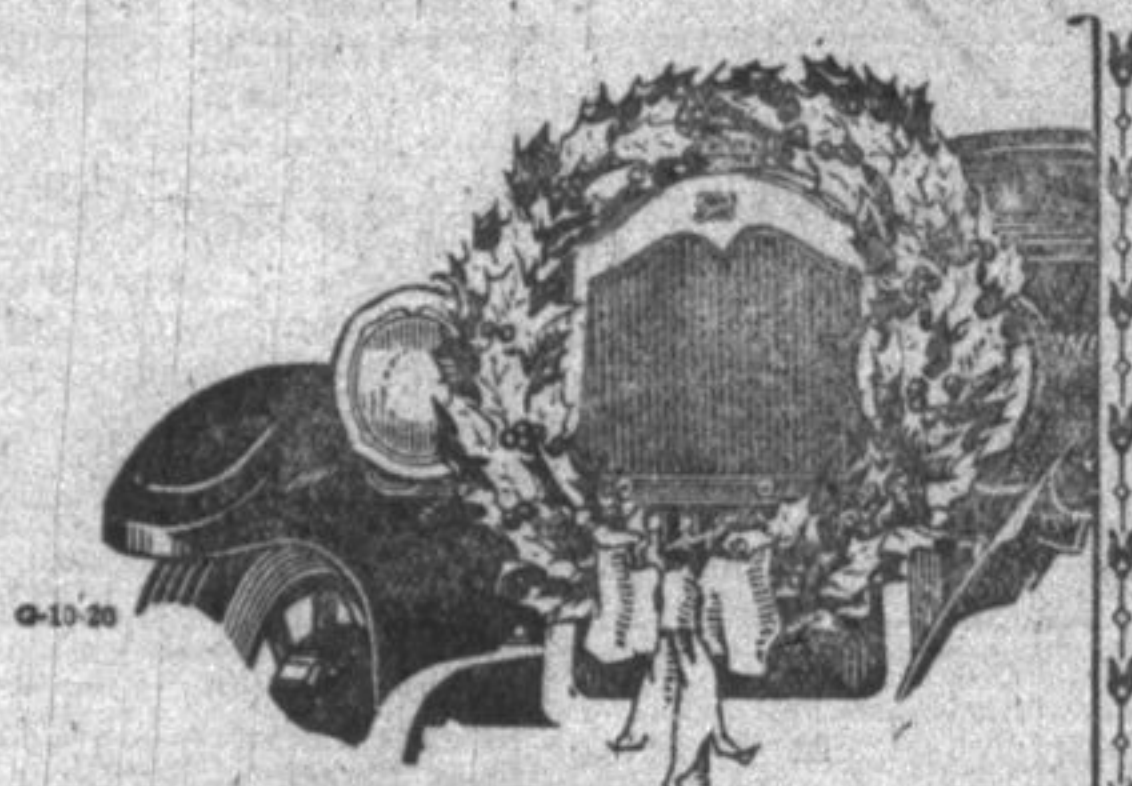

MAN IS NOT DIRECT DESCENDANT OF APE

ACCORDING TO AN EXHIBIT

Natural History Museum of Illinois' Display of Skulls From All Known Periods; Deductions

That man is apparently not a direct descendant of the monkey and the ape, is shown by an exhibit recently placed on display at the Natural History Museum of the University of Illinois.

Rows of real and reproduced skulls arranged in scientific order show the relation between the monkey, the ape, and man. The exhibit is prepared as part of the work of the university in teaching outside the classroom, and in giving practical examples to supplement the class training.

Period of Apes

According to Frank C. Baker, curator of the Museum, the period of the apes began about three million years ago. The monkey line is straight, showing but a slight rise in development, while the line of the anthropoid apes shows a considerable rise.

The Man of Java is the next step above the apes. Somewhat later than the Ape Man the present line of humans started in the Pittdown or Dawn Man.

Old Man Cro-Magnon, found in France and supposed to have lived twenty-five thousand years ago, preceded the four races now living, the White, the Chinese, the Negro and the Australian.

The points of divergence of the different races are indicated in the exhibit, bringing out clearly the places in history where the lines of variation began to separate.

Struggle Upward

The whole exhibit plainly shows that man's upward development has been a struggle toward a larger, more complex brain and greater intelligence. This is indicated by the gradual enlargement of the frontal lobes, giving a higher forehead, and the comparative reduction of the size of the base of the brain, controlling the more distinctly animal propensities of man. It is to be noted that one race, the Neanderthal did not increase the frontal lobe of any appreciable extent and that it became extinct before the beginning of the Recent period.

PHOTOGRAPHS OF DUNES DISPLAYED AT LIBRARY

New Vestibule and Entrance Being Built to Children's Room; New Books

Supplementing the art books recently purchased for the library by Mrs. Frank C. Peyraud, are three handsome folios of colored plates illustrating the history of ornament and design in ancient, medieval and modern times. Each folio is carefully prefaced, and offers abundant resource for the chronological study of art and archaeology. Two other books of art interest are "Color Schemes for Modern Interiors," showing a great variety of color combinations, and "Protectos de Interiores," giving glimpses of Spanish interiors—so much in vogue since the Florida boom. "Since Cezanne" by Clive Bell is another recent addition to the art shelves, containing criticisms of the post-impressionist school of painters which descends from Cezanne and in which his influence is so clearly traceable.

There has been a shift of scene in the show case at the library, and there is now on display an exhibit of unusual photographs, some of the Indiana dunes and others of Rocky Mountain National park. The photographs were loaned to the library by Miss Clara Jacobson of Chicago, well-known to the Chicago Prairie club as an able photographer of the dune country. Her "dune pictures," with their broad expanse of sand and their waving grasses remind one of soft Japanese prints; her mountain pictures show careful choice of subjects and powers of discrimination.

Work is under way for the construction of a new vestibule and spacious entrance to the new children's room at the library, to replace the original "needle's-eye" entrance built twenty years ago.

BRAUN HEAD COUNSEL FOR MOTOR CLUB NOW Made Record In Breaking Up Many Speed Traps; Hits Tin-Star Cops

Joseph H. Braun, for years a member of the legal staff of the Chicago Motor club, has been appointed general counsel of the organization to succeed Ota P. Lightfoot, who has resigned.

Mr. Braun figured prominently in the defense of the Duncan sisters at Cicero, and in the breaking up of many notorious speed traps near Chicago. The most widely known of these speed traps was the one conducted by Magistrate Ladislov Naymen, who operated at Western avenue and 143rd street, in the village once called Posen.

Tin star coppers frequently have been made the objects of Mr. Braun's ire, and when the so-called department of constabulary became active and formed large groups of "special" constables, combinations were created between these groups and justices of the peace and police magistrates in out-

lying towns. Mr. Braun's opposition to these combinations, which were superseding the regular authorities, culminated in the filing of a half million dollar libel suit against the club. When the matter came up in the superior court of Cook county, it was disposed of on a demurrer, in which it was contended that the department of constabulary had no valid legal existence in that it was a private organization, and under the constitution constables are elected, not appointed. Such organizations, it was held, can be formed for evil as well as good purposes. Later, investigation developed that many of these constables joined the organization for the purpose of carrying a revolver.
