

## Deerfield News

The regular meeting of the village board of Deerfield was held Monday night, December 7. There were several very important matters laid aside for special hearing on Monday, December 21.

The appeal for modification of the zoning ordinance by William Plagge-Kopschull Paving Co., the board of trustees passed a resolution setting aside a re-hearing for this case in conjunction with the board of appeals for the above mentioned date.

Mr. Plagge claims the judgment handed down did not give due consideration to his property holding adjacent to the aforesaid tract of land under consideration.

The preliminary hearing will also be given on the engineer's drawing of the widening of the business district on Deerfield and Waukegan roads, from sixty-six feet to one hundred feet. All of the property holders within two blocks of this vicinity who would be affected by this improvement are invited to attend this meeting and discuss the preliminary proposals and plans.

The village board and the board of local improvements will meet in conjunction with the board of appeals and the plans commissions on this same night.

### High School P. T. A.

To Miss Rachel Baldwin, former librarian of the Deerfield-Shields high school, was given the tribute, "she is considered one of the foremost librarians in Illinois," by Miss Whitman, the new librarian in D. S. H. S. in her talk to the high school Parent-Teacher association at the December meeting, held in the English club room last Thursday afternoon in a discussion of school activities by pupils and teachers.

The boys' glee club under the direction of the music teacher, Mr. Dink- loo, with Wallace Reichelt at the piano, sang "When the Bells in the Lighthouse Ring" and a double quartet gave "Honey Mine."

Miss Edwina Roberts told of the importance of the musical organizations in high school life, and said that fifteen per cent of the boys in the school play some sort of instrument. The Deerfield-Shields high school band received sixth place in the state contest held at Urbana last year.

The various clubs in operation in the high school were related by Miss Harriet Beers.

James Cain, chief counselor, explained the councilor system, the purpose of which is to make life more agreeable for students and teachers. In the trials the students are led to see their errors, instead of punished.

Miss Marion Rosenstein gave the three-fold reasons for the school publication, The Shore Line, which contains ten thousand words, one sixth the number in a modern novel. No attempt is made to train pupils for professional journalism.

George Benson presented the cause of the school annual. The six hundred books published last year cost \$2200, but were sold to the students for a dollar and a half each. The advertising paid for the annual.

Miss Welch, the dramatic teacher, told of her work to get the students to express themselves, overcome their self-consciousness and exhibit their native ability. The first play "The Goose Hangs High" was announced for next Friday evening in the high school auditorium.

Miss Whitman said that Deerfield-Shields high school has a splendid library, and comes up to the standard in other parts of the country in every respect. The one thing lacking is adequate seating space which should be from five to ten per cent of the enrollment. Only thirty-six can be accommodated in the room. Miss Whitman made a plea for more modern fiction as the supply is not equal to the demand.

"Parties are an essential part of education, as the working of an experiment in chemistry or the mastering of a chapter in history. They are not excrescences nor frills," Miss Wilson, the dean of women, told her audience in her discussion of social activities. The social calendar was outlined. The next all-school party will be at Christmas time. Chaperones are not invited to the school parties. All members of the faculty and Parent-Teacher association are urged to attend the social affairs.

The D. S. H. S. P.T.A. voted to give \$75 to comforts for the rest room of the men of the faculty, also to pay the ten cents per capita to the Illinois Council of Parent-Teacher associations.

The women of Deerfield and Fort Sheridan were hostesses during the social hour, which followed the program.
