

The right-ofway of the Skokie Valley route is 188 either within or closely adjacent to the boundaries of the beautiful North Shore suburbs of Evanston, Winnetka, Glencoe, Highland Park and Lake

The Judges

The committee of judges, who will choose the ten winning names from the vast number submitted, is composed of the following prominent persons: S. Charles Iverson, president of the Chicago real estate board; William L. Bailey, professor of sociology at Northwestern university; Frederick Rex, municipal reference librarian of the City of Chicago; Miss Caroline McIlvaine, librarian of the Chicago Historical Society; and Daniel H. Burnham, chairman of the Chicago regional plan commissions.

Construction work on the new Skokie Valley route continues to progress at a satisfactory pace, according to North Shore Line officials. Everything indicates that the new line will be completed and in operation ahead of the date originally set. Work is now under way on erection of the five substation to relay electric power along the line. Construction of the new stations is expected to star in the near future. Winter weather is in no way impeding activities.

One of the main objects of North Shore Line in rushing the nev Skokie Valley route to completion is to have it in operation for handling its portion of the vast throngs that will attend the international Eucharist congress, to be held next June the Catholic seminary at St. Mary's of the Lake, Mundelein. CASTLE IN THE AIR AT OLYMPIC THEATRE

One of Best American Operettas Being Sung This Season; Good Cast

"Castles in the Air" looks like a substantial fortune for its promoters 2 at the Olympic theatre, Chicago. It is half musical comedy, half operetta, gay, graceful, humorous; something different and something delightful. And it is no exaggeration to say that it was received with quite as much enthusiasm as Chicago last year gave to the premiere of "No, No, Nan-

The neatly workable plot is woven about a rich man's ward who changes clothes with a cigaret girl at the country club to deceive a young collegiate whose friend has posed him as a prince. The rich man hires him to go en impersonating the prince in the kingdom of Latavia where Americans will visit, and there it turns out that he is no other than the prince himself-but willing to go back and become a good American husband.

The cast, unlike that of "Nannette" seems to be just about what it ought to be at the start. The surprise of this cast is its heroine, Vivienne Segal. The role fits her closer than her tidiest topnote. Miss Segal is more than a heroine; she is a singing girl.

Others in the cast are Irving Beebe as the rpi; cnoMney,t Beebe as the prince; Monty, Nannette's friend, Bernard Granville; Thais Lawton as the queen mother; Joyce White as a western soubrette, not to mention twenty girl and twenty boys in a chorus which simply cannot make their vitality keep still.

Good taste, good color, good music with more real tunes than jazz, good fun, good people, and good taste, in the direction of John Mechan, make "Castles in the Air" look like not only a hit but an achievement. Thnigs are happening in the American theatre that never happened before, and this delightful blend of comedy and operetta is one of them.
