intersection and near the subway, which is a dangerous intersection, was taken into the scheme, and the road curved in back of it. That shows a little island and more facility for traffic in that regard.

Now, you probably have been studying this somewhat. It is possible the Plaza scheme would go through in this way. It is possible that merely St. Johns avenue would be widened. But whether or not the Plaza scheme goes through—and that bottle-neck we have got there is simply stopping up the whole town in its traffic, it certainly will have to be removed in some way—whether or not the Plaza scheme goes through that way or some other way, do you want to tell the Park board that you want us to go ahead with this portion south?

At the last meeting you seemed to want it, and if you do want it, we want to go ahead. We want to hear the public opinion just as strongly and is unanimously as you will give it to us, because we certainly are not going to force something of that nature on the people if they don't want it.

I believe, from everything I have heard, from that meeting, from conversation since, everyone who has spoken to me about it has been strongly in favor of the Park board going ahead with that sort of thing. And now you have understood the financial requirements behind it, you have a rough estimate of the amount it would cost, and figure it out for yourselves, you see the thing right before you, you see the kind of architectural front we will have when we get through, it is now really up to you to tell us what you want to do, and the Park board would be very grateful for any expression of opinion. (Applause)

Mayor Hastings: I just want to say a word on that Park scheme. Last night I met a gentleman who said he was with twenty-five other men in

Wilmette for the purpose of preparing a Plaza scheme for that little city. If this scheme can be carried through in connection with the Plaza scheme, which is pretty well developed, it will make Highland Park with the best entrance there is anywhere in any city in the United States. I don't believe you can afford to allow this plan that Mr. Millard has presented to be turned down, and lose the opportunity to secure that property which is practically vacant now.

Gives Good Idea

BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Interesting Happenings Here and There in This Part of the North Shore; Doing at County Seat

Waukegan will be a part of the metropolitan police district with Chicago as the center, according to plans being made by Chief of Police Morgan Collins of Chicago, to combat crime.

The annual federal appropriation for the maintenance and repair of the Waukegan harbor this year is \$19,000, according to word just received from Washington.

Twelve indictments out of thirteen cases, made up a day's work for the grand jury that convened and adjourned last week.

With a letter of acceptance from Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, director of the United States Veteran's bureau the fountain and pergola at the neuro-psychiatric hospital, at Great Lakes, offered by the U. S. Liberty Drivers Alliance of Chicago, is as-

sured. A few details remain to be settled as to design, after which work will be started.

The discovery of a skeleton in a sandy grave on Dead Lake, in the Dead River march region on the flats three miles north of Waukegan by a trapper last week, set the sheriff's office working on the problem to learn who the body might have been. The decision was that it was the skeleton of an Indian and probably 100 years old.

Official information has reached the Great Lakes Naval Training Station, it was announced recently by Captain John F. Hines, the commandant, that its activities will be greatly increased as a result of more recruits being temporarily diverted to it.

The North Shore Electric, operating busses between Waukegan and Kenosha, in a petition submitted to the Illinois Commerce Commission last week asked for a right to increase the bus fare between Waukegan and the state line, whereby, if granted, the fare between Waukegan and Kenosha will be 58c instead of 48c as at present.

Waukegan people were shocked last week when a wire came through from Sheffield, Ala., announcing the death of Major Ed. H. Clifford, for four years secretary of the Waukegan Chamber of Commerce, who early this year went to Sheffield where he became secretary of the chamber of commerce of the Muscle Shoals district.

WASHINGTON Y. W. PLANS BIG DRIVE

Conducting Campaign Through-out Country for \$700,000 Building Fund

Adopting as its slogan "A Capital Gift for Capital Girls," the Y. W. C. A. of Washington, D. C., will conduct a nation wide Christmas campaign for a \$700,000 building fund, December 2-15.

Mrs. Robert Lansing, wife of the former secretary of state, will head the national campaign committee. Mrs. William Howard Taft, Mrs. Herbert Hoover, Mrs. John Hays Hammond, Miss Mabel Boardman and Mrs. Herbert E. Day are among her assistants on the committee.

Young women come to Washington from every state in the Union, declares the committee in explaining its reasons for seeking a national gift. The population is largely transient, Washington having more than 27,000 girls in government employ alone. Living in furnished rooms, Washington offers these young women few resources within their limited means. The association, hampered by the poor location of its present building, has during the past year reached 12,000 of these young women. The \$700,000 sought will be used for a new building to be located near the government offices. A swimming pool, gymnasium, club and class rooms are to be among its features.

Because of the needs of these young women who come from homes in every state of the Union, the National board of the Y. W. C. A. has given its sanction for a national campaign.
