COUNTY BOY SCOUT COUNCIL PLANNED

Meeting Held at Waukegan on Tuesday, and North Shore Well Represented

A meeting was held last Tuesday night in Waukegan, for the purpose of forming a Lake County Boy Scout Council. In addition to representatives of the two organized councils, Wankegan-North Chicago, and the North Shore council of Highland Park, Deerfield, Highwood, Fort Sheridan and Ravinia, there were representatives of the following towns: Antioch, Lake Zurich, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Libertyville, Gurnee and Zion.

The Waukegan-North Chicago council has done the pioneer work in laying out the plans for a county couneil, maps showing the logical Scout districts and division of territory in the county. Due to the amount of pioneer work done by the Waukegan council, they felt justified in calling an organization meeting with representatives of the interested communi-

ties above. Due to the fact that the question of a Lake County council has not been formally presented to the Scout coun-cil of the Highland Park district, its representatives were unable to say that the North Shore council was def-

initely in favor of a county organization. However, the opinion seemed to be that they would more highly favor the plan of Regional Headquarters,-that is, organization of the north shore communities into a North Shore council separate from the Lake County organization. This would, of course, call for team work on the part of the towns from Lake Bluff south to Winnetka. The opinion of the Lake Forest representatives was that they were inclined to favor

the North Shore project. The North Shore council representatives and the delegates from Lake Forest agreed with Mr. F. D. Chadwick, the deputy regional Scout executive who is in charge of the expansion program along the north shore that more real good could be done for scouting in this district through the organization of the communities along the north shore from Winnetka to Lake Bluff, inclusive, than could be done through the organization of a strictly Lake County

The meeting adjourned without definitely forming a county organization. The question of a North Shore or a Lake county council will be put up to the North Shore council at its next meeting in January. Lake Forest is waiting for their decision before agreeing to enter the county organization. Whatver action the North Shore council takes in the matter will be based only on the thing that will assure the greatest good for scouting along the north shore, and the best method of reaching those communities lying back from the lake shore who are not at present receiving the benefit of organized scout- RAVINIA PLAYS
