You must be careful that you do not lose all of its primitive beauty," Mr. Jesse Lowe Smith, the principal of the Elm Place School of Highland Park, warned his audience, the Deerfield Garden club, at a most interesting meeting held at the charming home of Mrs. George Truitt, formerly the Vedder farm, on Waukegan road.
