U. S. POSTAL RATES CHEAPEST IN WORLD

Postmaster General Now Compares It With Some In Other Lands

The United States has the cheapest postal rates in the world according to Postmaster General Harry S. New who says in the current issue of the National Republic:

"To those who complain of the rates of postage in the United States, let it be said that ours is the cheapest postal service in the world. I have seen statements publicly made, extolling the service of the London post office and stating that the English housewife feels absolute security in ordering at 10 o'clock in the morning from a provision store ten miles away, the supplies for her evening dinner.

The British service is good—excellent—but that statement is purely fanciful. I have the authority of General Williamson, the Director of the British Postal Service, for saying that there is no such practice in England and that there never has been. Without meaning to institute comparisons, our parcel post service gives in some respects more than the British. The English weight limit is eleven pounds to the package, while we will take one at seventy pounds for the first three zones and fifty pounds for the others. The unit cost of a parcel transaction in the United States is, I am quite certain, cheaper than that in any other country of any considerable size.

The cost ascertainment shows that for the year 1923 the postal service handled 23,054,831,638 pieces of mail matter of all kinds and that the average expenditure per piece was 2.49 cents plus. What did this expenditure represent? It represented first the collection of the piece of mail where not actually deposited in a post office; the handling of that piece in the postoffice of origin; its distribution there; its delivery from the Railway Mail service to the postoffice of destination, and its handling there and its delivery either directly by carrier or other service to the addressee, whether on a city, rural or star route. It represented an average railway haul of 442 miles. This was the average distance carried of every piece of mail committed to the service. For all this service the department expended on the average less than two and one-half cents per piece."

ANDREW JACKSON WAS NATIONALIST

Like His Predecessors He Was Not In Favor of Foreign Entanglements

Like his great predecessors, Washington, Jefferson and Monroe, President Andrew Jackson was a strict nationalist according to Frank P. Litschert, who writes of "Old Hickory" in the current issue of the National Republic, giving a number of extracts from his addresses. On the subject of Jackson's nationalism Mr. Litschert says:

Jackson was a strict nationalist as were his predecessors in office. He was not in favor of foreign entanglements and like Jefferson was thankful for our isolated geographical situation.

In his second annual message, dealing with the treaty with Denmark, Jackson said: "Our country, by the blessing of God, is not in a situation to invite aggression, and it will be our fault if she ever becomes so. Sincerely desirous to cultivate the most friendly and liberal relations with all; ever ready to fulfill our engagements with scrupulous fidelity; limiting our demands upon others to mere justice; holding ourselves ever ready to do unto them as we would wish to be done by, and avoiding even the appearance of undue partiality to any nation, it appears to me impossible that a sincere and simple application of our principles to foreign relations can fail to place them ultimately upon the footing on which it is our wish they should rest."

PARIS TRADESMEN GET TOURIST MONEY

"The smallest tradesman in Paris, a dairyman, grocer, butcher, makes on an average eight or ten times more than the general of an army, the rector of the Sorbonne or the president of the Court of Appeal," writes Raymond Recouly in the Christmas Scribner's Magazine.

"This is a fact of which the natural and moral consequences will certainly be very great. It is at present introducing a radical change in French society.

"Paris, as a result of the greater or less wealth of the strangers who flock to it from all parts of the world, has become a colossal pleasure resort, the greatest of all, a veritable fair of nations. Certain central districts from the Place de l'Opera to the Place de la Concorde, passing by the Place Vendome, form a sort of international settlement where French has long since ceased to be the popular language. English most of all is heard, Spanish, sometimes German. One never counts in francs but in dollars, pounds, and pesetas. This part of their capital is practically prohibited to the French—the natives; that is, to all who do not ply a trade, who do not produce or sell something. They have the right to walk in the streets, perhaps stand on the sidewalks, or look in the windows, but never to enter the stores or restaurants, which are much too expensive for them. It is a state of affairs they accept for the most part with good humor and philosophy, telling themselves that, after all, the presence of all these strangers tends, in spite of certain drawbacks, to bring in money and wealth to the country."

FEDERAL TAX LOWER, BUT TOTAL IS NOT

In spite of the general propaganda looking toward lower taxes and despite the fact that federal taxes declined \$125,000,000 the total taxes paid by the people of the United States in 1924 increased two per cent over the amount paid in 1923. The increase was in state and local levies. The total taxes levied amounted to more than seven billions of dollars and the state taxes increased \$119,000,000 while the cost of the local government at the same time increased \$147,000,000.

Although the tendency of federal taxes is downward and the burden is decreasing each year, the amount of national taxes is still four and a half times what it was in 1913, according to the latest report of the national industrial conference. The increase is of course principally due to the cost of the war and increased overhead in the government resulting from the war.

The most significant fact, however, is that while federal taxes are being reduced the amount of the state and local taxes is still steadily growing. The increase of local taxes in New York and Philadelphia, despite their great size is only two per cent more than the national average.

It was found, the report says, that in many large cities, the living expenses are below the average for the United States. In Pittsburgh, Memphis, Buffalo, Los Angeles, Birmingham and Norfolk, expenses were above the average for the country, while living expenses were below the average in New Orleans, Cincinnati, Scranton, Baltimore, Boston, Portland, Me., Minneapolis, Savannah, Houston, Indianapolis and Mobile.
