**EXTENSIVE SAVING SHOWN BY BUREAU IN INTERIOR DEPARTMENT**

More Than Half-Million Dollars Annually Is Record; Famine Feared In Timber In This Country

More than eighty-two millions of dollars in administration costs have been saved by the department of Interior during the past two years, according to the annual report of Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, just made public. It is also set out that there was a reduction of the appropriations for the departments in 1925, less than 1924, of more than thirty millions. The department has dropped 2013 employees since 1923 and saved greatly by the reorganization of the General Land Office in Washington, D. C., consolidation of local land offices, and discontinuance of offices of surveyor generals. These savings alone have amounted to a half million dollars annually.

**Fear Timber Famine**  
"At the present rate of consumption the country will soon be confronted with a timber famine. The governor of Washington predicts timber in his state will be exhausted in twenty years. The value of timber sold from public lands in 1925 was \$817,952.

"With the disappearing of the nation's supply, all available lands containing timber stands should engage the attention of Congress. Existing methods of disposing of timber lands on public domains, have checked speculation at the government's expense, but the timber is not being preserved. As soon as it passes into private ownership the marketable timber is cut and sold, young growth damaged and brush left as a fire menace.

"I believe Congress should authorize discontinuing the sale of all government-owned standing timber on public lands for a ten-year period."

**Reclamation Projects**  
The report opposes new reclamation projects stating that there are large tracts of land on irrigation projects which are without settlers and that there should be no new projects until the old problems of development and settlement have been solved.

The report continues: "A report will be made to Congress with recommendations under the new reclamation law covering the proposed charging off of about \$26,000,000 losses levied against unproductive lands and not recoverable by the government. If this relief is approved, it will relieve many farmers from indebtedness they cannot meet because of obstacles such as land of little or no value."

**ORGANIZE PURE MILK DEALERS' ASSOCIATION**

Owners of Tested Herds in the County Unite In Supplying Clean Product

Lake county, the birthplace of the Milk Producers' association 17 years ago, was last week the birthplace of another organization of milk producers who have already tested and eliminated any animals infected with tuberculosis from their herds, and who agree to continue the test as required by the state and U. S. governments.

The name of the new organization is "Federal Tested Herds Association of Lake County."

Some 140 dairymen attended the meeting held in the Libertyville theatre and a census taken showed they owned nearly 3,600 dairy cattle. There is a movement on foot to organize all dairymen now supplying milk to the Chicago market, who have clean herds, into one organization.

**PUBLIC SERVICE CO. HAS BIG AUTO FLEET**

More Than Four Hundred Power-Driven Machines of One Kind and Another

There are now upwards of four hundred power driven vehicles in the Public Service company's fleet. They comprise many varieties of cars and although the majority are actuated by gasoline engines a goodly number are electrically operated — upwards of twenty-five, in fact. The latter class is receiving further additions.

An example of the special machines is furnished by the trench diggers which open a trench for a gas main, or water main, or conduit to a depth necessary.

**Back Filling Machines**  
Companions to these trench diggers are back filling machines which do the work, implied in their names, that is fill in the trenches. They are caterpillars and are operated at a large saving of labor and of time.

A winch and pole derrick mounted on a truck has been in operation some time and is being duplicated.

The company maintains a thoroughly modern repair shop in Evanston. The equipment includes every machine necessary for complete overhauling and rebuilding of cars and trucks. A recent addition is a cleaning machine which enables a solution to be forced under pressure into the cars needing attention. The result is an expediting of the process and a thoroughness, together with saving in labor and, of course, time.

**POSTAL DEPARTMENT STILL HAS DEFICIT**

And Like All Other Government Controlled Business Always Will Have, Belief

The increase in the wages granted to postal employees caused a deficit in the postoffice department which the increased postal rates provided by congress have failed to meet by half, according to the annual report of the Postmaster General, Harry S. New. During the last six months of the fiscal year a little over \$32,000,000 was paid to the employees in the way of additional salaries, and for the fiscal year these increases will amount it is estimated to \$70,000,000. The increase in postage rates will net the government, during the same time, a little more than \$32,000,000 it is estimated, or not quite half enough.

Outside of the increase in salaries authorized by congress, the expenses of the postoffice department increased but three per cent. The actual deficit of the department, however, including the salary increases is a little more than \$39,000,000, which makes the deficit in running the postoffice department aside from the salary increases about \$7,000,000. A number of economies were inaugurated and the receipts for the year were increased as well as the efficiency of the department.

**WARNS OF DANGER CHRISTMAS FIRES**

State Fire Marshal Prohibits Use of Candles In Public Places; Schools

School authorities of Lake county are much interested in a warning that has just been sent out by John G. Gamber, state fire marshal in which he recalls the Christmas eve tragedy of last year when 36 persons were burned to death in a school house fire.

The warning applies also to all gatherings where there is danger of a conflagration. The following telegram from Springfield conveys the warning: Springfield, Ill., Dec. 11.—Recalling the Christmas eve tragedy last year, when 36 persons were burned to death at a Christmas celebration in a country schoolhouse near Hobart, Okla., State Fire Marshal John G. Gamber today warned school authorities throughout the state to take care that a similar tragedy is not enacted in Illinois. Many Illinois schools are constructed similarly to the Oklahoma school and as lighted candles are used on Christmas trees, conditions would be almost duplicated.

This warning carries the statement that the use of lighted candles on Christmas trees will not be tolerated at any public gathering. If electricity is not available the tree must go unlighted, the statement says. If lamps are used to light the buildings care must be taken that they are not near inflammable articles and that they are firmly fixed in substantial brackets.

**SUGGESTION AS TO EASY BACKING CAR**

Some drivers never do learn how to back into a small space. Here is a suggestion offered by the mechanical first aid department of the Chicago Motor club. If the driver who has trouble in parking will set his front wheels perfectly straight, and then cut a notch in the steering wheel directly in front of the driver's position, he will ever afterward be able to back in without any trouble.

**AUTO ACCIDENTS IN WINTER AND CAUSES**

DISCUSSION BY EXPERT

President of Motor Club Points Out That Seasonal Trouble of This Kind Due to Lack of Care

The large crop of automobile accidents produced every year by the winter months and the disproportion between this number of accidents and the number of vehicles on the streets, was the subject of a warning issued to local motorists today by Charles M. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor club.

Mr. Hayes called attention to the result of an investigation by the accident prevention departments of several large A. A. A. clubs in various sections of the country. This investigation, he declared, clearly proves that motorists by and large do not make allowances for winter conditions on the highway.

**Congestion Not Cause**  
"The fact that in many cases the curve of accidents sharply rises in the winter months when there are fewer vehicles on the streets," he said, "shows conclusively that congestion alone is not the cause of accidents. The findings of the accident prevention departments of scores of A. A. A. clubs are unanimous on the point that motorists fail to make the right adjustment in their driving habits when wintry weather arrives.

"It has been proved, for instance, that in some cities the accidents on a wet day increase by about 100 per cent. The traffic officers making the counts noted that on the whole the motorists involved in these accidents were going at the speed which they had come to regard as safe in dry weather and had they made the necessary adjustment and reduced speed twenty-five per cent, it is safe to assume that there would be no increase in accidents. In other words, a twenty-five per cent reduction in speed on a wet, slippery pavement is absolutely necessary to restore the margin of safety and offset the disadvantages of poor vision and skidding.

"Another thing that causes many motorists to come to grief is the degree of confidence that they place in chains. Chains, it has been shown, may be a good aid in keeping the safety margin but are by no means a preventative against accidents. It is not the chains themselves but the fact that the motorist is liable to be over-confident that leads to trouble.

**Flirting with Undertaker**  
"The man who takes chances on a wet day for the simple reason that his car is equipped with chains, is simply flirting with the undertaker.

"One way in which we can reduce our accidents during the winter months, is simply to recognize that it is winter and that the conditions under which the automobile is operated involve increased hazard factors. To meet this condition, the motorist must undergo a psychological adaptation.

**PEOPLE LOSE FAITH IN LEGISLATION**

Too Many Laws Make Public Fear Meeting of Every Session of Legislatures

One of the striking developments in American policy has been the decline of confidence in the legislative branch of our governments, says the Nation's Business. There is no lip service to the theory of separation of powers, but many feel that the executive and judicial departments have been exchanging their power and prestige at the expense of the representative bodies.

"It is no wonder that many people are concerned, if not terrified over every approaching session of the general assembly," wrote Governor Donahay of Ohio in the course of one of his veto messages a few months ago. "If future general assemblies will keep on piling up taxes and creating jobs at the rate of this and recent ones, what may we expect in another twenty-five or fifty years? Unless a halt is called soon, the time is too near for comfort when one-half of our population will have to pay the taxes to keep the other half on the public pay roll."

Chambers of commerce, bar associations, taxpayers' leagues, and countless other organizations and individual citizens are protesting at the continued increase in statute law, but the flood continues unabated. North Carolina enacted 1,173 measures, New York 686, Tennessee 812, Indiana 218. The total output of this year's sessions was probably between 10,000 and 12,000 enactments. While it is true that many of these enactments are not "laws" in the sense of prescribing general rules of conduct, but mere administrative regulations of local or special application, there is a large enough residuum of genuine law to hamper and embarrass the conduct of business and personal affairs and to increase the difficulty of keeping out of jail.
