CENTRALIZED BUYING

As an additional aid to governmental economy the administration at Washington is said to be planning to center the purchase of the supplies used by the government in one bureau or purchasing agency. It is believed that an important annual saving can be effected by such a plan. At first the method will be tried out in the purchase of gasoline and coal, but if it is successful it will gradually be extended to all commodities.

The cost of federal supplies purchased approximates \$200,000,000 a year. These are purchased by different departments, some at wholesale prices, and others at retail.

New legislation will be required to center all purchases in one bureau, and the budget officials are said to be preparing the necessary bills to be presented to congress when it convenes next winter.

Many states of the Union have inaugurated central purchasing boards for the requirements of the various state institutions, and when these are properly run, there is a great saving to the state. By purchasing in large quantities better prices are secured and a better standard of goods maintained. There seems to be no reason why a central purchasing board would not prove effective for the federal government. It is at least worth considering.

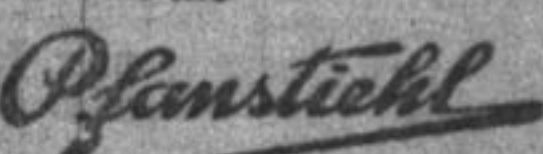

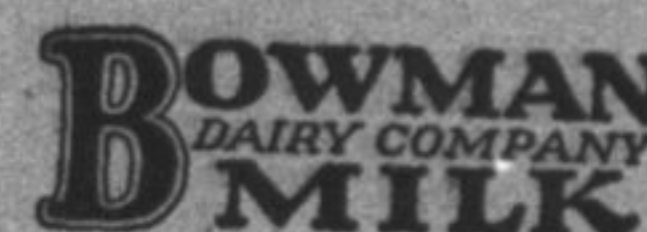

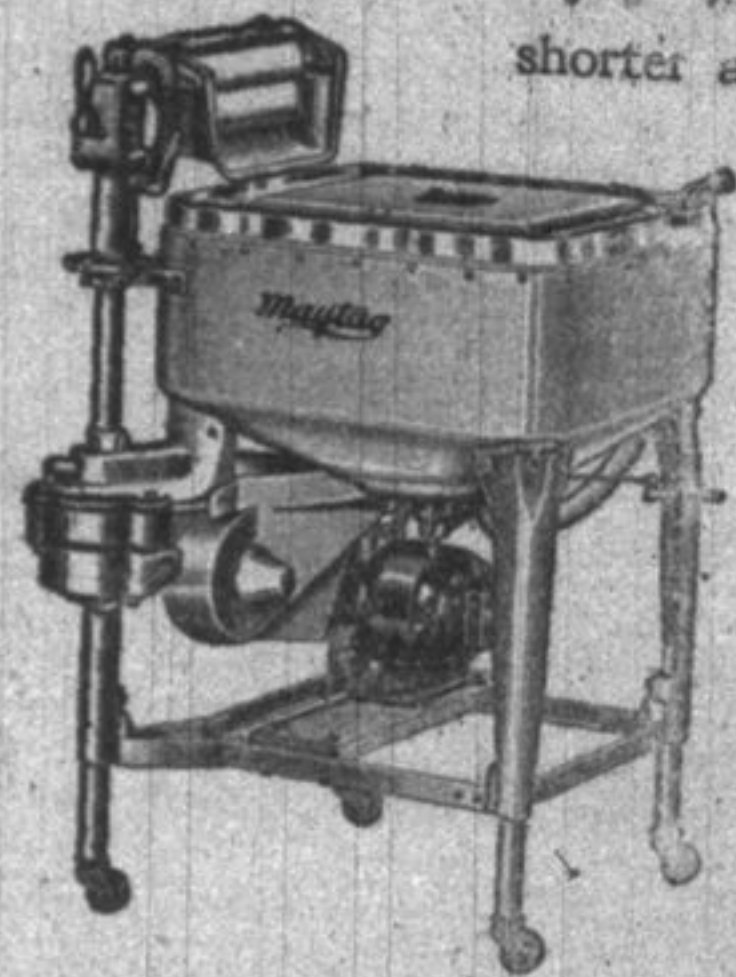
