**PUBLICITY ASKED IN
PAVING CONTROVERSY**

ATTORNEY FOR OBJECTORS

Take Exception to Methods of City Authorities in Matter of Special Assessment No. 292, Ravinia

The following letters from the attorneys interested in the matter in controversy are printed at their request and without comment:

Jan. 5, 1926
Highland Park Press,
Highland Park, Illinois.
Gentlemen:

We wish to advise you of the proceedings in Highland Park Special Assessment No. 292, for paving a system of streets in Ravinia.

Objections were filed September 19, 1925 at the June term of County court, objecting to an assessment of \$15.00 per lineal foot on each side of a 19-foot pavement which is at the rate of \$104,728 per mile and double the actual construction cost of like pavements along the North Shore.

The Corporation Counsel then offered first a 15% reduction to withdraw objections, then 20% and said the proceeding would be dormant if it was not accepted but had judgment of confirmation entered against all property not objected for at the June term of the County Court.

Early in the October term of the County Court on behalf of objectors we moved the court to set the case for trial that objectors might have a day in court to determine from the evidence and under the law whether such an assessment was just and equitable and have the pavement constructed, to which motion the petitioner strenuously objected, but the court set the cause for hearing on January 5th, 1926. On December 30th, Corporation Counsel stated unless the objectors would accede to his offer of a 20% reduction and withdraw there would be no trial; that he would not take a chance to have a public benefit taxed against the city by a trial in court.

On December 31, 1925, a local attorney under a letter dated December 29, 1925, from Mr. Holmes, Corporation Counsel, without any notice to any of the objectors, or showing any reason as required by law or any compliance with statutory requirements, dismissed the proceeding. We then wrote a letter to the City Officials, appealing for fair play, a copy of which is enclosed (and printed below), and having no reply, we then, on January 5th, filed a written motion to set aside the order of dismissal and set the case for hearing. Again, this motion was continued for hearing on motion of the attorney appearing for Mr. Holmes to January 11th.
