PUBLICITY ASKED IN PAVING CONTROVERSY

Copy of Letter to City
 Dec. 31, 1925

To the Corporation Counsel, Mayor and Commissioners of Highland Park, Illinois.

Gentlemen:
 In regard to Special Assessment No. 292 for paving Lakewood Avenue and other streets in the south part of Highland Park, we desire on the part of the property owners, who have filed objections in this matter, to make the following statement.

The cost of this improvement and the assessment against the property owners, in our opinion, based on information given us by engineers, and based on the cost of similar improvements on the North Shore, is twice as high as the real cost should be. The assessment is based on an estimate of cost of \$123,000 per mile for a 19-foot pavement when the actual cost should not exceed \$60,000 per mile. In the face of this you threatened to dismiss the whole proceeding unless the property owners would accept a reduction of 20%.

Our clients also believe that part of the cost of this improvement should be assessed against the City of Highland Park as has been done in practically every improvement of the same character in the past and also believe that at least a part of the \$30,000 included as cost of fills to take the place of bridges should be assessed against the public.

On December 11th last, the Mayor, at a public meeting stated, "the City has no debts of any kind or character except monthly current bills." Therefore it is apparent that the City can pay a public benefit if the court on trial of the case should so order. Furthermore, at the same meeting the Mayor stated that public improvements, such as water works and bridges, would have to be built and that four of these bridges would cost the City of Highland Park \$100,000. This supports our contention that if our clients must pay for bridges in other parts of the city, then the balance of the city should contribute to a similar improvement in this locality.

Our clients believe that they are right in their contention and only asked that the difference between them and the city be adjudicated in the County Court as provided by the Special Assessment Act. The City of Highland Park first proceeded to take this matter into the County Court by filing a petition in that court and notifying the property owners to appear on a certain day and file objections if they so desired. Pursuant to such notice property owners, represented by us, did file objections.

Apparently the city officers did not mean to give the property owners a day in court as provided by law and the constitution for the Corporation Counsel first notified us that unless we would accept what he chose to offer in the way of a reduction that the proceeding would be allowed to lie dormant and the property owners could do without the improvements. Then when we, on behalf of our clients, asked that the case be set for trial, and the case was set for trial over his objection, he told us that unless we chose to accept his offer the proceeding would be dismissed and again said the property owners could do without the improvement.

Evidently the officials of Highland Park are afraid to submit their actions to the scrutiny of a court. They apparently are prepared to deny the citizens of the city a fair hearing in a court of law and as a penalty for questioning the actions of such officials apparently the objector is to be punished by being denied the improvements to which he is entitled. In support of this we direct your attention to the fact that the Corporation Counsel has carried out his threat and that on December 31st he did, through his assistant, appear in the County Court and dismiss the proceeding.

We, on behalf of the objectors, have heretofore offered to waive all objections except to the spread being just and equitable as between the property benefited and the public and the questions of benefits and proceed to trial on these questions only. We now renew this offer and will consent to have the order of a dismissal vacated and the case tried and do hereby urge and request that this be done immediately.

We feel that from the facts in this case and the negotiations that have taken place and your threats to dismiss the proceeding were only a thinly veiled form of intimidation to deny the property owners a just and equitable spread of an assessment for an improvement which they all desire and are all willing to pay for upon any fair basis.

If you wish to be fair, treat this property the same as every other section of Highland Park has been treated for years, give them their day in court as is their constitutional right and a denial of which is arbitrary and bordering on tyranny.
