Evanston took time out, 49 seconds to play. On the tip off, Baker took the ball and sank a long one from the middle of the floor, score 22-20.

Martin and Lindenmeyer starred for us, Lewis did the same for Evanston, tying with Lindy for high score honors, each making 11 points.

Lights Defeated

Deerfield's ponies, led by Captain Davis, opened a superior passing attack. The boys, however, unable to get used to the fact that the gym was a little larger than those in which they were used to playing, were either shooting over the backboard or short of it.
