Grammar School P. T. A.

A most interesting program marked the January meeting of the Deerfield Grammar School Parent Teacher association, which was held in the seventh grade room Friday afternoon.

The pupils of the seventh and eighth grades presented a clever one-act play, "Uncle Sam's Country Store." The characters represented the countries of South America, Cuba and the Philippines, carrying on commerce with the United States and wore the costumes of the respective countries which they represented. Following the play, Citizenship from a Camp Fire Girl's point of view was delightfully outlined by Ann Warner. John Ott impressively quoted the teachings of the Boy Scouts and if the Boy Scout keeps the motto and lives up to it, he will become a good citizen.

"Obedience a Requisite for Good Citizenship," was the title of an interesting and instructive paper, which was read by Mrs. William Galloway.

"What is Good Citizenship and What is the School Doing to Promote it," was the subject of principal Otto's talk. During the course of his discussion, the civics course to be given this semester in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades was outlined. Heretofore, civics was taught only a

half year every other year in the two upper grades, which of course was not sufficient. With the present plan, it will be a full term course, which will commence in the sixth grade. The sixth grade course will be story method, study of community, water work system, fire department, police force etc. The seventh grade course will be more technical, and study of state government; eighth grade, national government, and detailed study of village and town government. The things which help toward good character, the foundation of good citizenship, are carefully observed during the school period.

Thrift, which is a requisite for good citizenship is being successfully carried on by the pupils and have reached the five hundred mark since school opened with the one thousand dollar mark as their goal.

Mrs. Chester Weasling, the secretary, read the January message from Henrietta Stark, the vice president of the Illinois State Council of Parent-Teacher associations, and announced the January radio program from station WMAQ, the Chicago Daily News, on Monday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock; January 25. The subject will be "The Pre-School Child."

The president, Mrs. J. A. Stryker, announced that in the future, there will be a number of Camp Fire Girls' in the first grade room, who will help care for children which will enable the mothers to attend the meeting.

Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Reids attended a dance at the Auditorium hotel in Chicago Saturday evening.

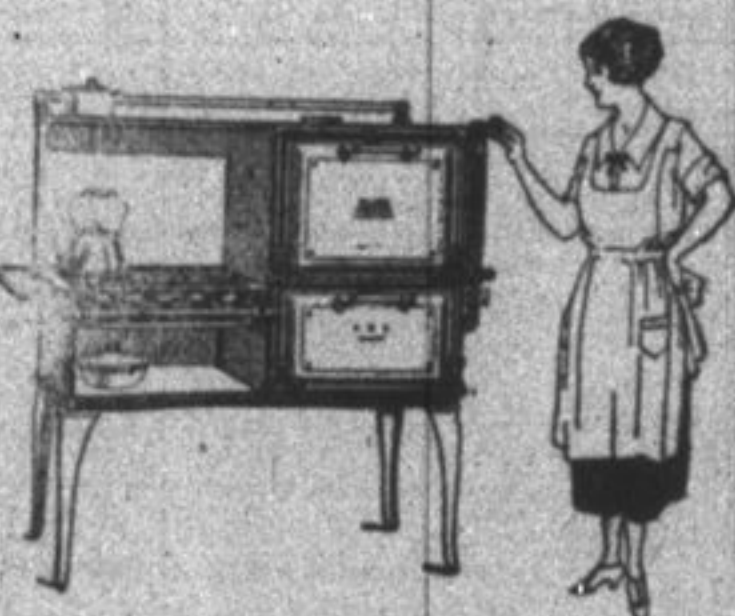
