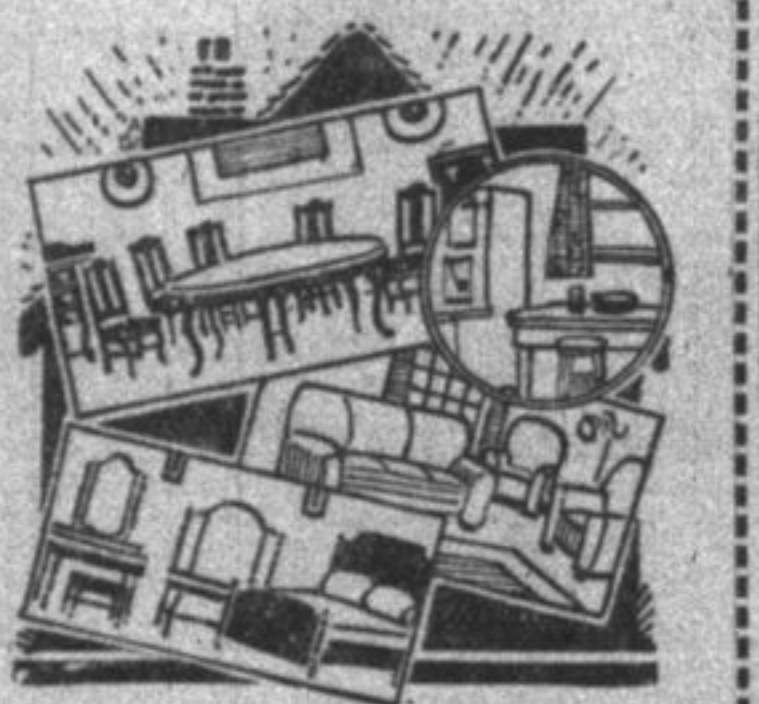

Sales aggregating approximately 3,500 acres in the vicinity of Mundelein and Wauconda have been made within the past two weeks by several groups of operators.

Building during the month of January suffered a decided drop in Waukegan over January of 1926, according to figures compiled today by Walter Nibelink, head of the building department.

Standardization of prices for bobbing of hair in beauty parlors with barber shops in Lake county is expected to result from the joint meeting of these specialists held this week.

Pass Resolution
