DEERFIELD TO PLAY OAK PARK SATURDAY

GAME ON H. S. FLOOR HERE

In Last Week's Games Locals Win from Evanston; Lose to Bloom; Details of Both Contests

On Saturday of this week the Deerfield-Shields basketball teams will play Oak Park cagers on the Deerfield school floor. Two great games are expected, as Oak Park recently defeated the locals on the Oak Park floor.

Lose to Bloom Deerfield received a double trimming at the hands of Bloom last Saturday night when the lights lost a fast game 16-15 and the heavies were on the short end of an 18-15 score.

Playing one of the fastest games that they have played this year, the lights lost a hard fought battle in the last minutes of play when Bloom came from the rear to win, 16-15.

Deerfield defeated Evanston's quintets twice last Friday night in the victor's gym. The lights won 18-10 and the heavies came out on the long end of a 14-11 score.

Evanston started the scoring in the lightweight game when Hart sank a basket soon after the whistle. Shots by Dickinson and Joyce put Deerfield in the lead, however, and they were never headed. The half ended with the score 10-5.

Toward the end of the third quarter Jimmy Dickinson was hurt in a mix-up, but was able to continue playing after a few minutes. Shortly after play was resumed he made two baskets in rapid succession.

Dickinson starred for Deerfield with five baskets and one free throw for a total of eleven points, while Hart scored high for Evanston, making one basket and three free throws, five points in all.

Heavyweight Game The heavyweight game was close except for the first quarter when the home team jumped off to a 6-0 lead. Evanston rallied in the second period and the half ended with Deerfield leading 8-6.

The visitors entered the last quarter trailing 11-7 and during the early part of the period attempted many shots, none of which went through the hoop. Finally Holland sank one from under the basket. Then, with about two minutes left to play, Bacheck tied the score at eleven all. Lindemeyer was fouled a few minutes later however, and his free throw put Deerfield in the lead again. "Alie" Baker cinched the victory a minute later when he sank a short one.
